# Time is running out to use up your NON-BARCODED STAMPS.

'Everyday' non-barcoded stamps will no longer be valid after 31 July 2023. They will not be accepted for postage after this date and could be subject to surcharge.

### What you need to do

- Check if you have any 'everyday' stamps which don't have a barcode. These 'everyday' stamps are easily identifiable as they have a plain coloured background with a picture of the Queen.
- Christmas stamps and special stamps (ones with pictures) are exempt and will remain valid for postage after the 31 July 2023. So, you won't need to worry about these.
- Use up any non-barcoded 'everyday' stamps where possible or swap these stamps for the new barcoded version. Logon to Royal Mail to find out how to swap your stamps. You cannot swap at the Post Office.

# HEARING DOGS FOR DEAF PEOPLE, a talk by Veronica Colley.

Aged 11, Veronica lost the hearing in her left ear following a riding accident and, in later life, lost the hearing in her right ear due to inherited 'early onset deafness'. After her accident, keeping up at school became a real problem and she had no qualifications when she left. However, in her late 20s she gained a degree and worked for many years as a social worker. Her final job, which she loved, was managing a retirement complex. In her 60s she decided to retire as her disability became more profound and at the same time her relationship broke down. Now living alone, Veronica decided to apply for a hearing dog.

Hearing Dogs for Deaf People was founded 40 years ago and, at first, used rescue dogs. However, they often had 'issues' due to their former treatment and nowadays cocker spaniels, cockerpoos and some Labradors are the chosen breeds. The organisation has 2,500 volunteers who home the breeding dogs so that puppies are introduced to family life straight away. Puppies are assessed for their personalities and traits from birth and, at 8 weeks old, are moved to live individually with other volunteer families who carefully introduce them to as wide a variety of experiences as they can. The young dogs can then be assigned to a deaf owner and start working between 14 and 18 months old. There is a huge demand for hearing dogs and quite a waiting list. It costs £40,000 to train and then look after a hearing dog throughout its life.

Veronica and her dog, Logan, have been together for some years now. Logan is intelligent and lively and loves to be busy all the time. He would alert Veronica if the fire alarm went off; he wakes her in the mornings when her alarm goes off; he alerts her to the doorbell; the cooker timer and to the end of the washing machine cycle. If he were with a young family, he could be trained to alert his owner to a baby crying or the child monitor sounding.

Some hearing dogs are assigned to children, where their reassuring presence helps the child to deal with the night terrors from which they often suffer and with the isolation in the playground at school. Hearing dogs can be trained to respond to the phone ringing or any other sound its owner needs to know about. First, they learn to respond to a squeaker and then the desired other sound is introduced alongside.

A fully qualified hearing dog can accompany its owner absolutely anywhere except an operating theatre in a hospital. This includes hotels, airplanes, hospital wards, trains, coaches and its presence cannot be refused. Not all hearing dogs are fully qualified in this way. Some are 'ambassadors' whose job it is to publicise the work through demonstrations; some are 'sound support dogs' who do not accompany their owners everywhere, but stay at home; some are 'hard of hearing' companions.

The working life of a hearing dog is regularly monitored and, when the person monitoring decides the dog is unfit to continue, he is re-homed for the rest of his life. Some hearing dogs themselves become deaf, some become unfit. For the organisation, the health and welfare of the dog is paramount. Veronica dreads the day when Logan has to retire, but hopes he could then go to live with her granddaughter. She would apply for another dog.

Wow, what a great Coronation weekend! Following the pomp and splendour of the ceremony itself in London on Saturday 6 May, Mattishall came together for a wonderful, if slightly less formal, village celebration on the Sunday. There was a fantastic turnout - even the sun was tempted to come out for the party and the whole event enjoyed some fabulous weather!

For our part in the Mattishall Coronation Village Fayre - and in the spirit of the national 'The Big Coronation Lunch' - Mattishall Community Hub hosted The Big Afternoon Tea. Much thought and planning by the MCH Team went into the project over the preceding weeks to make sure that it would be a successful occasion but until we opened those doors at 3pm we had no idea how many people would actually turn up! We needn't have worried, by the end of the day we had served well over 100 free, afternoon teas to some very happy and appreciative local residents and their families.

As a community group we were able to apply for, and were lucky to be awarded, a King's Coronation Grant from Breckland Council which enabled us to decorate the Memorial Hall, in suitably patriotic style, and to provide all of the refreshments and sandwiches free of charge (see the front cover). As for the amazing homemade cakes, these were all donated not only by the MCH team but by many kind people in the village to whom we are especially grateful.

In fact, we were also able to contribute towards the lovely Children's Picnic on the playing field and provide drinks and yet more delicious cakes to the Litter Pick as part of The Big Help Out on Monday 8 May. Our unused flags, 'crowns' and napkins etc. were put to good use by the Cubs who held a special party the following week. Even the 'King' (donated to us for photo opportunities) put in another appearance at their party!

The Big Afternoon Tea is the first big community project that MCH has organised but we intend to build on its success by putting on further events in the future - either independently or in cooperation with other village groups - to keep encouraging and promoting the fantastic community spirit that has been seen at the recent, royal, village celebrations. So, look out for our ads and posters in the coming months as we hope to arrange some exciting events such as a Quiz Night and a good old-fashioned Jumble Sale.

Community projects are one aspect of MCH but the other, equally important, is to provide a regular meeting place where people, of all ages, can come for some social contact; to meet new people; share interests and hobbies or just enjoy a cuppa and a chat in a relaxed atmosphere.

We meet once a month on a Tuesday at Mattishall Memorial Hall, South Green and we'd love to see you there. As the venue is a little way out of the village it would be great if lifts could be offered, perhaps to a neighbour that you know of who would benefit from a change of scene or is new to the village and hasn't yet had the chance to meet many local people.

Since our first session in October last year, we've built up a solid membership; some people come every month, others just now and again. # Episode 5 continued -

# The Little Tin Box

John Norton

Leaving school in 1967 was followed by a six week stint working for Sir Billy Butlin at his Holiday Camp in Filey, Yorkshire. One of my schoolmates had spent the previous summer working there as a waiter and so a couple of us decided to join him this summer. The application process was very simple, including telling a little fib about my age because I had not quite reached 18 which was the rule. I've heard that Butlins has had a lot of investment and is pretty classy now. But in those days, although still very popular, it was looking a bit tired and was beginning to feel the impact on business from cheap package holidays abroad. My first job was cleaning birds' and rats' nests from ovens in a kitchen and eating hall which was about to be opened for the peak season. Not very appetising. This was followed by instatement as a kitchen porter which was the lowest of the low and meant spending many hours in a secluded corner trying to provide some element of cleanliness to greasy pans. It was like an initiation ceremony because after a week I got promoted to the food service line. There would be about six staff, who all seemed to be students or ex-cons, standing in a row dumping an item of whatever cordon bleu food was being served onto a plate whilst being closely observed by Elsie the supervisor who delighted in raging at us. "I want stuffing on this hot plate!" was a particular favourite of hers. Also, very amusing to us was when she would shout "If you boys don't pull your fingers out I'll have your \*\*\*\*\* for garters". Eventually I graduated to become gravy man who was the final person in the row responsible for pouring on the Bisto and stacking the plates of food in a vertical rack.



The gravy was one of the few things that was very hot and you could always tell the gravy person by the red scorch mark on their thumb where the gravy had spilled as it was poured while holding the plate. If the roast potato was too big for the partitions in the vertical rack all the food would push off the plate as you tried to insert it. No problems – you just picked up the food with your hand and splodged it back on the plate. All in all, the food was pretty rank and as staff we had to survive on the previous day's leftovers for sustenance eaten in a dingy and dirty little windowless canteen. But it was character building and fun, particularly during the few hours in the day we had off. Although what did rankle was that the waiters got all the tips, more so if they deliberately dropped a plate of food when the hall would erupt with raucous cheering, and they refused to share any of it. Nevertheless, I still managed to earn the princely sum of £9 a week (full board included!) which would help when I started College after the summer.

Later that year I became a Mattishall postman for the Christmas period, which I talked about in the winter edition, and in the College summer holiday of 1969 I really hit the big time by working on the construction of the massive pipeline running from the Bacton Gas terminal on the Norfolk coast to the Midlands. This was to distribute gas from beneath the North Sea which had been discovered in 1963. This was a 7 day a week job and as a labourer you were paid about £25 a week which was a fortune. After pumping diesel to refuel generators I became a welder's mate which entailed following the welder with an enormous electric wire brush to clean the welds securing the joints in the pipeline. My remittance, however, paled into insignificance when compared to the pay of the "front end" welders who did the more difficult and important bit of the first weld around the pipe. They earned a staggering £200 a week and what characters they were. One weekend in six could be taken off and they would return on a Monday with the biggest hangover imaginable and often with a brand new car and divorce papers.

By this time my little tin money box was getting full to overflowing despite the fact that living away at College was not cheap although tuition was free and you actually received a grant. I blame the College bar for eating into my funds which necessitated me spending the summer of 1970, at the end of the final College year, earning a few quid before six of us took an old Bedford van, which we'd acquired for nothing and painted bright yellow – as is the wont of emerging hippies – and travelling overland to Greece.

My final temporary job before the long years of proper work took over was working as a labourer on an archaeological dig at North Elmham under the direction of Dr Peter Wade -Martin, the esteemed archaeologist from Dereham. I had my little minivan for transport by then, although I have to admit the tax had run out a couple of weeks earlier which I decided to forgo in the interests of funding our trip to Greece. There were two types of people on the dig. The first were the clever ones or those studying archaeology. Then there were four of us labourers who did the heavy work of digging trenches and pits. The site, which is near the church, ended up one of the most extensively excavated Saxon settlements in the country. It included the site of the Saxon cathedral and grave yard. After all the heavy work was done I was allowed to use a pointed tool and a soft brush to carefully expose parts of Saxon bodies in graves. I'm not sure if they were pleased to see me after all that time laying there but they didn't say anything.

And what happened to the little tin money box? Well, I really don't know but it served its purpose. I just wish I'd buried it on a Treasure Island somewhere for someone to find. In it I think I would have put a sprinkling of mixed corn, three blackcurrants a strawberry and a runner bean, a feather from a white hen, a remnant from my grandfather's goat infested trousers, a Butlins roast potato, a miniature electric wire brush and a Saxon's finger bone. I bet none of the best archaeological minds in the country would ever be able to work out the connection. **John Norton**



# MATTISHALL DEMENTIA SUPPORT GROUP

I have been coordinator for The Link, which is Mattishall's Dementia Support Group, for around 18 months now, and, generally speaking, it runs pretty well, session on session, much the same as it did from its inception in 2018, with a few minor tweaks and changes.

We can provide lots of information, have a thriving separate carers' group and promote the use of individual playlists and memory boxes to help in those distressed times. We have quizzes, word searches, puzzles to do as well as singalongs which suits our membership. Also, we had a very successful time at the Coronation Fayre.

But what of other people with dementia who don't find a group like ours useful?

I and other volunteers went recently to the Norfolk and Norwich University Hospital to the first Dementia Fayre they had been able to organize since covid. One of the presentations was from Dirck Geary, an ex-rugby player, who has early-onset dementia, who talked about his life - his golf, his driving, his decision-making. He shared that, along with Norfolk and Waveney Dementia Support Services, he has set up a Support Group in North Norfolk for people recently diagnosed with dementia. As he said, such people have different needs which are not filled by a 6 piece puzzle! They need to talk, share ideas and solutions to problems of living with the brain disease dementia.

So, what of those people in Mattishall recently diagnosed? Or those with dementia that do not have carers? Where do they go, to lessen their worst fears about their occasional symptoms and progressive diagnosis? I do not know. But if you are recently diagnosed and would like to meet with others fairly locally, please get touch and I will do what I can to facilitate it.



# **Desert Island Discs**





Hi, my name is David Hicks. I am a former caretaker at the Mattishall Primary School and before that Parts Manager at Ben Burgess, garden equipment, but now happily retired.

Mattishall has been my home now for over 20 years and I really enjoy the country life none more so than when I'm out walking the track and fields with my trusty springer Luna.

You may well also know me as the pigeon man of Mattishall. If you have ever seen a kit of pigeons flying over they may well be mine, either exercising around the lofts or returning home from a race. Pigeon racing has been a big part of my life for well over 40 years now and is something I'm very passionate about. An interesting and exciting hobby. If you ever want to no more, I can talk for hours on this.

These are my ten tracks that mean the most to me, not necessarily in chronological order.

Track 1 is by the great **Bob Dylan**, although he had many hits, this one evokes memories from a friendship I had in my teens, the most beautiful ballad, **Belle Isle** from his Self Portrait album. Definitely worth a listen.

Track 2 is by the Irish band **Thin Lizzy**, their most famous hit, **Whiskey in the Jar.** The reason I've chosen it is because of the evocative guitar playing in the beginning and also the fact that I saw them play this live at the Cromer Links Pavilion the weekend it went to Number 1. The Cromer Links was a great place to listen to live bands in the 70's. Gone but not forgotten.

Track 3 comes from the great **Paul Weller**, a song entitled **A town called Malice**, this brings back fond memories of listening to a Mod tribute band playing in a disused church in Brighton. The acoustics sounded fantastic in the old church.

Track 4 although late to the game, I have recently discovered the songs of Leonard Cohen and fell in love with the song called Suzanne. The words have a deep meaning and the guitar playing is beautiful. Cohen Leonard 'Live in London' is an album spending worth time to get to know. This song has been covered by many artists but one worth listening to is the version by Nick Cave and the Bad Seeds.



Track 5 You can't leave this band off the list, **REM.** Although it was difficult to choose just one song from them it had to be **Man on the Moon.** An awesome evening was spent in Hyde Park singing along to this song with 120,000 people. When the first chords were struck the place erupted. It was made even more special by sharing the occasion with my two sons on a balmy summer's evenings.

Track 6 **Jake Bugg** may be known from singing the theme tune to Happy Valley but one of my favourites of his is called **Broken.** This has very powerful lyrics and guitar playing. I enjoyed a night of his music at Cambridge Corn exchange.

Track 7 **Viva la Veda,** if ever a song wanted to get you singing and dancing it has to be this one by **Cold Play.** Again, saw these live at Earl's Court. The group with the most special effects imaginable.

Track 8 a change of tempo now, I have to include **Moon River**, not by Andy Williams, but the silky, smooth version by **Audrey Hepburn**. This reminds me of the year I spent travelling the world with my partner, Carol. In 2008 we departed the UK with a rucksack each, a paper map and flight tickets to New York and no idea how we were going to spend the next 12 months. We travelled North America, Mexico, Belize, Fiji, North and South Islands of New Zealand and Australia. On our final evening we climbed Sidney Harbour bridge at sunset. The words 'two drifters off to see the world, there's such a lot of world to see' resonated with us as we sung them to each other many times over the years.

Track 9 **the Pogues, Dirty old Town.** A great sing-a long song, especially in a bar in Dublin. I played this song at school back in the sixties and it has always had special memories for me.

My final Track 10 has to be **Dire Straits, Sultans of Swing** especially the version taken from the Alchemy Live recording, 3 minutes of Mark Knopfler singing and seven minutes of pure guitar bliss. This guy can get a guitar to sing like no other. Recommended to play the Alchemy Live version as loud as loud can be. Sit back and enjoy.

I would like to thank the Editor of the magazine for inviting me to choose my Desert Island Discs. I have had many happy hours listening to my favourite songs but making the decisions was very difficult. I've left out many favourites but what I have chosen represents who I am.





# UP, UP AND AWAY

"Mr Deckers Balloon with Decker himself in a boat annexed to it, ascended from Quantrells Gardens and very majestically. It was out of sight in about 10 Minutes, but appeared again on his descent."



Ballooning in the 18th Century

The above is an extract from the diary of Parson James Woodforde writing from Melton Constable on 1st June 1785. "Mr Decker" is a misspelling by the parson and it was in fact London toy manufacturer James Deeker who was on board. Deeker was called upon to build the balloon which would become the first to successfully cross the English Channel, a milestone he met on that day following a flight from Norwich which was watched by crowds including Parson Woodforde.

At this time of writing, the media is full of sightings of balloons over the US, Canada and South America. The objects have been variously described as spy vehicles, research equipment, weather instruments or UFO's! But to date I have found no concrete explanation as to what these objects may have been.

The prescence of balloons and kites have been popular in China for thousands of years, used for various purposes including military signalling. The first documented balloon flight in Europe was by the Brazilian-Portuguese priest Bartolomeu de Gusmão in Lisbon in August 1709 when he managed to raise a small balloon made of paper full of hot air. It was decades later when the Montgolfier brothers, paper-manufacturers by trade, following earlier animal experiments when they sent a cock, a duck and a sheep aloft, made the first successful manned balloon flight in Paris in 1783 that 'Balloonmania' had taken off, becoming a worldwide phenomenon.

The first successful British balloon experiment was also conducted in 1783 from Cheapside in London, when Italian entrepreneur Count Francesco Zambeaccari collaborated with an artificial flower maker to construct five small

unmanned balloons. Silk-sewing skills were scaled up the following year, when a substantially larger 'envelope' was exhibited at Cooper's Hall in Bristol for three days to great public interest. Meanwhile, the editor of the 'Encyclopaedia Britannia' – James Tyler – had read of the Montgolfier brothers' success and in 1784 subsequently built his own 'Edinburgh Fire Balloon'. This sailcloth contraption would earn him the accolade of the first manned UK flight, although it was the Italian Vincenzo Lunardi who was to ignite public attention with the first flight over England. Taking off in front of a substantial crowd, Lunardi's 24-mile journey earned him fame and fortune, with St Paul's Cathedral allegedly increasing its entry price for spectators clamouring for a rooftop view of the spectacular feat of human endeavour.

Another record would be set by aeronaut Charles Green in 1786, when the 'Royal Vauxhall Balloon' would set a world distance record for manned flight – 480 miles – that would remain unsurpassed for eight decades. This balloon used over 2,000 yards of raw silk at a total cost of £2,100 (well over £100,000 in today's money).

It was not only the civilian market contributing to the booming balloon-building business. Military experiments at Aldershot, Hampshire led the War Office to create a dedicated Balloon Section in 1890. In the First World War, the airships created by German Graf von Zeppelin in 1900 were used as bombers and for surveillance due to the fact that they could fly high above the battle zone. They were so effective that the Germans ended up using a total of 115 Zeppelins during WWI including several over Norfolk. In his book A Story of East Dereham, Ben Norton tells us "On the night of 8 September 1915, a Zeppelin dropped its bomb load on the Church Street area causing five deaths and considerable damage".

In the 20th century another entrepreneur and adventurist, Richard Branson, took up a number of ballooning challenges including the crossing of the Atlantic in 1987. He made the trip in the company of a Swede, Per Lindstrand, who was the balloon's designer. The 'Virgin Atlantic Flyer' was the first ever hot air balloon to successfully complete the Atlantic crossing, during which it achieved speeds of more than 130mph. The balloon was also the biggest that had ever flown, with a total volume of 2.3m cubic feet.

While aeroplanes, jet engines and helicopters may have replaced the Zeppelins and gliders of World War II, drones are active in 21st century warfare and satellites now are the main tool for weather-forecasters, what might these recent balloon sightings really have been?

We can still experience the thrill of the first man-made flights with companies operating hot-air flights in Norfolk and Suffolk.

The Short Walks (under 4 miles) programme continues on the first Friday of every month -, 7 July, 4 August, 1 September and 6 October. These walks always start at 10:15 unless otherwise advised: the starting point may vary (though will always be near Dereham town centre), so please check on arrangements. Other than that, you don't need to book - just turn up at the right time in the right place. Please note that short walks do not have programmed refreshment stops, but there are usually a number of short halts for people to collect and catch breath, so if you want to bring something to eat and/or drink, there will be opportunity to consume it. The walk will be led at a reasonable pace - we do not rush, but we do need to make progress for the group as a whole; if you have any questions about our speed, please raise them with us. You should come with decent footwear (especially when it's been wet) and suitable clothing. The walk will go ahead unless the weather is really bad.

We are also continuing our monthly Easy Tuesday walks. These will be no more than two miles, on good and even surfaces and expected to take about an hour. The pace will be steady with regular pauses to catch breath and afterwards there will be an opportunity to have some refreshments (bring your purse!). These walks will be on the second Tuesday of each month, meeting outside Dads and Lads (Cherry Tree car park) at 10:00. Age UK are well aware that arranging social care can be a challenge. From knowing where to start, what type of care and support you need and who pays for it, there are lots of questions to ask. But they remind us that we are not alone — they are to help us through the process.

# A Community Allotment for Mattishall?

Community allotments are becoming a popular addition to many communities around the country. The interest in growing our own fresh fruit and veg, coupled with the increased understanding of the mental and physical benefits of working together in the out of doors has led to a rise in popularity of allotment gardening in general.

Not everyone is confident or fit enough to take on a full or even a half sized allotment of their own. This is where community allotments can fill a real need. There are almost as many ways of using such spaces as there are groups taking them on.

Some provide "starter beds" for those new to gardening, others offer space and support to various community groups such as local schools, youth groups or those with health or accessibility issues. Others run plant or seed swap events – or grow plants to be distributed to other sites around their village or community area. The key is that they are run by members of the community, for the benefit of the community.

Here in Mattishall we have a rare opportunity to consider having our own community allotment. Denbury Homes, who are building the Kingfisher Estate are in the process of transferring land to the village. It is planned that this will include land for a community orchard, community woodland and enough land for more allotment plots for rent.

The Parish Council will consider allocating one of the plots for community use if there is enough interest from villagers to do this. Whilst they are prepared to offer some initial support the key to such allotments is that it is run by the community who can, and should seek further support from sources other than the Parish Council. For instance, Breckland Council offer grants to support such initiatives and there are other sources too. Locally, East Tuddenham is already in its second year of a community allotment which is now running and there are several in the Norwich area too.

I am willing to take the initial lead in setting this up – but it will need others to be part of the team – to come up with ideas and be willing to steer the activities. How much work this might take will very much depend on how ambitious we want to be and how much funding we might attract. We would not be starting until at least the Autumn when the land is available and we can start small and grow slowly.

This great opportunity will only happen if there is enough support and interest in the village so at this stage I am asking for anyone who thinks they might be interested in doing a bit – however small – to make this happen or for anyone who wants to know more to get in touch with me. Alternatively have a chat with me at the Mattishall Hub meeting on 4th July when I will be asking folks what they think.

# Year 1



# Year 2

She was obviously heavily pregnant. Within a week of arriving with us she had her 4 kittens. There is so much help out there to get your cats neutered/spayed. You only have to contact local cat rescues to get full information and advice.

There is a knock on effect of this. Rescues centres are already full to the brim with cats looking for homes and this just adds to the burden. Now is the time to think seriously about booking that appointment not just the females, but the males too so we can avoid more cases like Natalia being cruelly dumped.

# Safe School Run Pledge





Our annual needs assessment for our Life skills curriculum tells us that Road safety is of high importance for our local community. In our most recent consultation with our school stakeholders it stated how important it is and the Public Health profile for our community also has it as a high risk. We promote road safety awareness in school with the support of the Norfolk County Council (Road Safety Communities Team), the police and Pedal Power (Bikeability).

We encourage our children and families to walk, bike or scoot to school where at all possible. We appreciate that this is not always possible as adults might be dropping off their children on their way to their place of work. Some families choose to park a bit further away from school to ensure that they walk/bike/scoot some of the way. This not only reduces the amount of traffic on the main road outside school but promotes a healthy lifestyle.

Safe parking outside our school is of high importance. It helps our children and families to feel safe & confident on the school run.

We all have a responsibility to ensure that all our children feel safe during the school drop off and collection time. We do have a permit badge system that allows some adults to use our school car park. This is reviewed annually and adults are asked to apply for a permit that is authorised by Mr. Chapman our Headteacher. There should be no adults that do not have a permit using the school car park.

The children from Year 1-6 discussed their journeys to and from school in class and have shared their feedback with School Council. Here are some of the findings:

### How the children get to school most days?

Mode of transport	Number of children
Walk	42
Bike	12
Scooter	16
Car	69
Bus	13

We asked children to discuss in their classes how they felt when they are dropped off / picked up at the end of the day. This is what they said:

To meet these identified needs of feeling safe and confident, we have launched a 'Safe School Run Pledge' that parents/carers can sign up to.

The aim of this 'Safe School Run Pledge' is to promote responsible and considerate parking when children are dropped off or picked up outside our school.

# Safe School Run Pledge:

# By signing the pledge, you would agree to:

- Walk to school whenever possible or parking further from the school and walking the last bit of the journey
- Park safely outside the school. Keeping the yellow zig zag line outside the school gate free. This keeps the area clear so all road users can see the school entrance and keep our children safer on their way to and from school.
- Not park on the pavement pavements are important for our children to walk to school. They need to be kept free of obstructions and to enable the independence of vulnerable, older, or disabled people who may have visual or mobility impairments who need to use the path. To allow families with pushchairs to safely walk on the pavement without having to walk into the road to go around vehicles parked on the pavement.
- Park considerately and think about the local resident who may need to access to their homes.
- If applicable not to park in the staff car park (this also applies to parents/carers dropping children off, picking up for any school clubs) unless authorised by the School.
- Turn off my engine when parked (improving air quality & keeping us healthier)

This initiative is supported by Norfolk County Council, Norfolk Constabulary, Norfolk Fire and Rescue Service.

# **News from the Surgery**

Following positive feedback from our Patient Engagement Event on 28th April we wanted to share some information and statistics that were presented along with an update on our progress.

# **Surgery Update**

We continue to face high levels of demand for services as we head towards the summer. As you may be aware from various news articles, pressure on GP services it at an all time high.

- a) We aim to provide high quality, safe care but cannot offer limitless appointments. We are offering more patient contacts now than we did pre Covid. In 2019 the Practice provided 46,360 appointments and in 2022 we provided 52,641. The projection for 2023 is that the Practice will provide in the region of 57,932. The clinical staff normally arrive at 8am and it is not unusual for them still to be here beyond 8pm due to their increased workload. They often work continuously through their lunch breaks carrying out home visits, dealing with hospital letters and prescriptions. We physically cannot safely offer more appointments than we already are.
- b) There is no additional funding for us to recruit additional healthcare professionals to support us in meeting this unprecedented increase in demand, nor do we have the infrastructure to accommodate any additional healthcare professionals, an issue we have be trying to address with the NHS for over 7 years.
- c) We currently receive £102.78 per patient per annum to provide as many appointments, home visits, telephone consultations a patient may require. Realistically, this fixed amount of funding is enough for each patient to have an average of about 1.5 appointments per year, based on the average number of times a patient visited their GP 10 years ago. However, the average pre covid figure was six appointments per year with some elderly and vulnerable patients seeing us ten to fifteen times a year.
- d) We have a phone system that allows us to monitor telephone calls, and this reports that in March 2019 pre-Covid we received a total of 7202 telephone calls, in March 2023 we received 12,071 telephone calls, this demonstrates and increase of some 68%. During this time, we have only had a change in practice population of ONLY 100 patients.
- e) Why the increased demand? Many reasons include;
  - An ongoing population with more complex health needs
  - Increased 'medicalisation'
  - Doing more work that historically has been done by the hospital

This is not a plea for you not to contact us, but an explanation as to why you may be told that there are no more appointments available today.

What can you do? Consider seeing:

- An alternative health care professional than a GP
- A pharmacist can help with minor illnesses



- A physio, reception can book an appointment with a First Contact Physio who can assess musculoskeletal issues and liaise with us if more investigations are needed
- A social prescriber, reception can book an appointment with a social prescriber who can help with issues like finances, social care, housing.
- WIC (Walk in Centre), if you feel you need to be seen today and we have no availability you may be asked to go to the WIC. You can visit Rouen Road or GP front door at the N&N.

# **Pharmacy Update**

We are working hard to improve services in the Pharmacy. We have a number of new staff, and it can take us up to 12 months to have them fully trained.

One of our biggest contributors to the queue is patients coming in early to collect medication.

It is currently taking 7 working days to process repeat prescriptions.

Please sign up to the SMS (Short Message Service) service to be notified when your medication is ready to collect, to save a wasted journey. To sign up please email snccg.mattishall-dispensary@nhs.net with 'SMS' in the title and include your contact details.

The collection kiosk has been installed. We have experienced some software/IT issues but are now accepting patients who wish to trial this service. To sign up please pop into the Pharmacy to complete a consent form.

We are also very excited to announce the purchase of a Dispensing robot which is due to be installed in the autumn, further details to follow.

# Would you like to support your local Surgery?

We are currently reinvigorating our PPG (Patient Participation Group) and have our first meeting booked in June. Being part of the PPG offers a patient's perspective on the services we provide. We want to facilitate good relations between the practice and patients and believe the PPG will enhance our communication.

As a teaching practice we work with the UEA (University of East Anglia) to offer students first-hand experience with patients. You can volunteer for a student consultation which enables them to discuss your medical condition, this provides the students real clinical experience with real patients.




