

Mattishall Community Speedwatch Team

The Mattishall Community Speedwatch Team are currently looking to increase our volunteers to record vehicles exceeding the speed limit in and around the village.

We do regular unannounced sessions somewhere in the local area once or twice a month for approximately one hour. Health and Safety instruction is given as well as training on how to use the speed recording device. Safety equipment such as high viz jackets are provided.

To explain our role, we do not issue speeding tickets, we record vehicles that exceed the set speed limits and this report goes to the Norfolk Constabulary. The first time a vehicle is reported, a letter is sent to the registered keeper. The second time the same vehicle is recorded anywhere in Norfolk or Suffolk another but stronger letter is sent. On the third occasion of being recorded in either County, an officer will visit the home of the keeper and offer "words of advice".

As a team, we give up our time to keep Mattishall safe from those that choose to ignore the speed limits around our village. Speeds recorded have been between 35 mph and into the mid 40's. If you feel that you could give us a couple of hours a month, please contact me by email or phone. I would be happy to answer any questions.

WE'RE ON OUR WAY TO WEMBLEY

Some of my earliest memories involve kicking a ball around. I feel sorry for my mother having to carry me for 9 months with me practicing penalties day and night. I blame my father. He was a keen Norwich City supporter and it wasn't long before visits to Carrow Road became a regular Saturday excursion. In those days before all-seater stadiums, we'd arrive a good hour before kick-off to get a good place to watch the game, armed with a wooden box for me to stand on. If it was already a bit congested the crowd would part like the Red Sea to let youngsters with their boxes get to the front where we could peer through the railings at our heroes like Johnny Gavin, the Canaries all time top scorer, and centre forward Ralph Hunt.

In the 50s Norwich were in the Third Division South which, with its northern counterpart, was the lowest tier of the football league. Things weren't going well, and I recall a dismal rainy afternoon in 1956 when we got thrashed, the only bright spot being my introduction to a tall, bullet-headed centre-half called Charlie Billington who hailed from Wisbech. He was as hard as nails but unfortunately was lacking in the skill and mobility department. The season culminated with the Canaries bottom of the league which meant they had to apply for re-election to avoid entering non-league football. Ironically, that season, arch-rivals Ipswich Town ended up top with one of their icons, Ted Phillips, as top scorer. I can't tell you how difficult it is for me to be reminded of that fact.

But you have to be at rock bottom to be able to move up and at the end of that season, with re-election to the football league achieved, a Scot called Archie Macauley was appointed manager who had a miraculous impact. I continued my quest to become a professional footballer by constantly kicking a ball against the wall of a shed in the back garden (on occasions breaking the kitchen window, which didn't go down too well) and diving in the mud to save the rebound. I just wish replica shirts were available in those days rather than the tacky old yellow tee-shirt my mother had found in a jumble sale.

The Macauley effect was consolidation in season 1957/58 and unbridled near triumph in 58/59 when the Canaries were a hairsbreadth away from being the first third division club to reach the FA Cup Final. It started inauspiciously with a win over non-league Ilford Town, followed by a 1-1 draw away to Swindon in the second round. Before the replay the draw for the third round was made and the winners would have a home-tie against the mighty Manchester United. With huge excitement the replay was won, and on a freezing cold Saturday afternoon in January the match with the renowned "Busby Babes" of United (so called after their manager Matt Busby who had developed an ensemble of top young talent,

sadly depleted in the tragic Munich air disaster of 1957) was played on a snow covered Carrow Road in front of a capacity crowd which had been limited to 38,000. Against all the odds the underdog Canaries won 3-0 with two goals from Norfolk-born centre forward Terry Bly and one from a speedy Canadian winger with a blonde crew cut called Erroll Crossan. The local Pink 'un football paper headline that night was "Bly, Bly Babes". The football world was stunned, albeit the 3 inches of snow on the pitch may have helped our cause.

I went to the 4th Round match at home to Cardiff City which was a tense affair ending in a 3-2 victory. This time the *Pink'* un headline was "Ta Ta Taffies". You have to admit those headline writers were good. In the 5th Round we were drawn away to another huge team, Tottenham Hotspur at White Hart

Lane. I should have been one of the 67,000 attending but managed to go down with bronchitis before the big day. Another Terry, this time Allcock, gave us the lead but Spurs equalised. Incidentally Terry Allcock became a Funeral Director in Norwich his retirement, a



business which is still going. I can't see Harry Kane doing that. The hero Bly yet again did the business in the replay as we came out 1-0 winners.

A quarter final visit to Sheffield United was the reward. This ended up in another 1-1 draw at Bramall Lane which in those days only had stands on three sides of the pitch. What made this match memorable was goalie Ken Nethercott dislocating his shoulder in the second half, but there were no substitutes in those days so he heroically played on making one-handed saves right to the end.

By this time Monday evening queuing for match tickets at Carrow Road was becoming the norm. For the replay my dad and I joined the enormous queue which snaked for probably half a mile through Bracondale, but after a couple of hours we were rewarded with tickets. Yet Another 38,000 crowd was shoe-horned into Carrow Road with a newly acquired goalkeeper, a South African called Sandy Kennon, making his debut in place of the injured Nethercott. He was as nervous

as a kitten and spent the whole game pacing backwards and forwards between the goal posts like a caged tiger. It was a brilliant match with Irish winger Bobby Brennan getting the winner in a 3-2 victory. I was right in line with his shot which was simply sublime as it curled into the net. At the end of the match I kept saying disbelievingly "blimey, we're in the semi final of the Cup." I remember being in a euphoric haze as we came out of the ground packed like sardines shuffling along Carrow road. I was able to lift my feet off the ground and be carried along by the joyous horde.

By this time Norwich City was headline news. All the national papers and TV news reports were full of giant-killing David and Goliath stories about the Canaries. Norfolk had become the centre of the universe. The semi-final was against the "Hatters" of Luton Town to be played at a neutral ground. Another London trip to the home of Spurs at White Hart Lane was called for. Again we queued for hours for tickets, but it was fun. Everybody was in such high spirits. The big day arrived and I would guess over 30,000 people decked in yellow and green made a mass exodus from Norwich by train, coach and car. We were on one of the many special trains laid on and the two and a half hour journey was spent singing in camaraderie with our fellow supporters. At the ground the famed Canaries mascots were on parade. One chap wearing a top hat was dressed top to toe in yellow and green and he carried around a toy Muffin the Mule while another was dressed as a Norfolk dumpling. They paraded by doing continuous circuits of the pitch to rapturous cheering and repeated renditions of "On The Ball City" obliterating the noise of the Luton supporters. Much of the country, outside Luton, was willing us on, but the occasion may have got the better of us and we ended up scraping a 1-1 draw with new goalie Sandy Kennon playing an absolute blinder. It was a bit of an anti-climax, but we were still in the Cup and the replay would give us a second chance. The journey back was quieter, mainly because everybody was exhausted, but the singing continued until we pulled into Thorpe station. For some reason my main memory is a woman with a glass of something intoxicating in her hand standing up and doing a passionate rendition of "Carolina Moon". That song has stayed with me for the last 65 years.

Nerves were jangling when the following Wednesday afternoon the semi-final replay kicked off at St Andrews, the ground of Birmingham City. I was at Yaxham Primary School and special dispensation had been given for pupils and teachers to listen to the live broadcast of the game on the big brown school radio. It takes a lot to keep a load of 5-10 year olds quiet but the silence when an Irishman, Billy Bingham, scored Luton's winning goal was deafening. At the final whistle we were stunned and tears began to fall on the cheeks of most of Norfolk and, probably, the country at large. We had come so close. But what a story it was and what a fantastic time we had lived through – never to be repeated.

My love affair with Norwich City has continued to this day. A few years after the famous Cup run when my mates and I were about 16 we used to go to Carrow Road and say that we were 14 so we could pay only 1s 6d entrance because we were "boys". After the match in the evening we would go to the Gala or Samson and Hercules dance halls and say we were 18 so we could buy a pint and look cool to the girls before catching the 10.30 No 13 bus home to Mattishall. But for all the fun, excitement and success the Canaries had in later years I think the recently departed Sinead O'Connor sums it up with her classic anthem "Nothing compares to you". No, in the annals of Norwich City folk lore nothing can ever compare with the 1958/59 cup run.

Sundry Musings

Today I should like to talk about me. No, not me but specifically, the word 'me.' I think it's been getting a lot of bad press recently and I would like to redress the balance.

Cast your minds back to childhood when you were reminded that "Billy and me went to the park," was improper use of language (specifically grammar) and that it should instead be "Billy and I went to the park". I'm sure we all remember it being foisted upon us that 'I' beat 'me' hands down, whether or not you had a friend called Billy. Well, the tide has turned and now it's the word 'me' that needs a resurgence. There are many situations where 'me' is appropriate and society has mistakenly become hung up on the use of 'I'.

Let's take an example:

Anthony Andrews said in BBC's Brideshead Revisited many moons ago "Would you care to dance with my friend and I?" Cue nails on a blackboard and much tooth grinding on my part as it surely must be "Would you care to dance with my friend and me?" that is, would you like to dance with me, "my friend" simply an add on. "Would you care to dance with I" being something Eddie Grundy from the Archers might say, indeed, it's useful to omit the other person from the sentence to establish whether 'I' or 'me' applies every time.

"Those plates are for dad and I" is ungainly and ought to be those plates are for dad and (for) me. "Don't point that gun at Robin and I, is more accurately, don't point that gun at Robin and (at) me.

Lately I've seen and heard too many "My friend and I" scenarios to mention and it's getting to me. Yes, you're absolutely right that I should take a chill pill and get a life, but it all came to a head when a colleague proudly announced, "It's my husband and I's wedding anniversary on Saturday". I screamed inwardly. Are we so frightened of saying me and my?

I'm no strict grammarian – indeed I'm quite clueless about gerunds, the proper use of speech marks and the semi colon gives me flashbacks, but although language must evolve, grammar is the skeleton which supports that language and, I think, needs to be preserved to a certain extent. Naturally "Robin and I" has its place when we are the subject of a sentence i.e., "Robin and I enjoy conjugating verbs," but when we are the object or the indirect object of a sentence then Robin and I becomes Robin and me, or 'us'. So, 'me' ought to appear far more often than 'I' does. (Boy, I had trouble getting that one past the spellchecker).

Let's try again:

Robin and I want the ball; Give Robin and ME the ball; Give the ball to Robin and ME. Ok, so we've stopped playing ball now, but you get the gist...if you would say WE then it's 'I' but if you use US then it's ME. You and I are WE: You and me are US. Yes, I know that sounds awful.

In sociolinguistic terms, this misuse of 'I' is called hypercorrection, and comes from our desire to speak and write "proper English." It's a personal toe curler for me (Robin and me) but don't lose sleep over it. I can cope. Probably.

I dare say there are numerous uses of grammar and language that infuriate us, as is evidenced by the proliferation of books

on the subject and the popularity of the grammar book by Lynn Truss 'Eats shoots and leaves' which is a humorous look at punctuation (and no, that's not an oxymoron - humorous punctuation).

You should all send examples of your linguistic pet hates to the editor before the next publication date, and we can all grind our teeth together. It's all up to you and me.



REJECTION

It is just possible that one of my three regular readers will remember the moving story of my encounter with a scantily clad lady in Ber Street late one April night. Alright, I exaggerate. One of my two regular readers. But the wretched episode is relevant to the theme of this edition's exercise in literary butchery.

I was walking from King's Lynn to Great Yarmouth to raise funds for a charity. After sixty miles I was foot-sore, grumpy and none too fragrant, but she was a true professional and unwilling to discriminate against those challenged with poor personal hygiene. She made the offer. I rejected her and the look of relief on her face was a wonder to behold.

But rejection is not always a pleasurable experience and I still bear the scars from some that I have suffered.

I used to own a Citröen Dyane. It had many shortcomings but the worst was a refusal to start if the morning temperature was below 20 degrees or if there was any moisture in the air. Perhaps it would be better to say that it started properly three or four times a year. As a result, it was unwashed, unloved and covered in dents where I had kicked and punched it in frustration. The inside was a bit of a mess as I ate my breakfast as I drove and had been transporting some bales of straw for a friend. The crowning glory came one Friday in July when I bought a couple of Cromer crabs and forgot about them until the following Monday when they made their presence felt.

But on that November afternoon, four months later, quite a lot of the smell had dissipated or perhaps I had just become used to it. I was travelling between remote villages in the Fens when I saw a wretched figure at the edge of the road. He was soaked to the skin and as he limped along he stuck out a despondent thumb to ask for a lift. If I passed him by then there was precious little chance of any other traffic in the next half hour and so I slowed down and stopped next to him.

He opened the door, stuck his head in and started to say 'Can you take me as far as Ely', when he saw the straw and rubbish and then the smell hit him. He gagged and without hesitation said 'I think I would rather walk.' And then totally un-necessarily and rather hurtfully he added "Do you keep livestock in there?'

Rejection even by a stranger is not nice and to this very day I still feel the pain. But rejection by a loved one is something totally different. If I can hold back the tears I will now tell you a tragic story of how I was rejected by a beautiful blond who was the love of my life. Worse still it was a personal and public humiliation. If you are even the slightest bit squeamish, now would be a very good time to stop reading.

Daffy was slim and honey blond. She had brown soulful eyes and a black nose. For a Labrador she was intelligent and I was deeply and madly in love with her. But for one small thing she would have been perfect. That tiny failing was her insatiable appetite for manure and anything rotten. Rolling was not enough for her and most evening walks ended with me shouting "drop it' and Daffy defiantly, and even insolently, eating what she had found while never breaking eye contact with me.

None of us are perfect and until that awful night I did not really hold it against her.

Alcohol plays some part in this. At the end of a long meal with friends and family round the table and empties strewn everywhere I looked down to see Daffy sitting beside me. She looked so beautiful and appealing that I couldn't resist it. I leant towards her announcing that I was going to give her a kiss. As my head approached her she appeared to catch a whiff of my breath. Her lovely face became contorted with disgust and even with her strong stomach she could not take it. She turned her head away and then ran off to her basket whimpering as she went.

The scene was witnessed by friends and family who were all familiar with Daffy's usual preferences and to this day harsh and unkind references are made. I still blush with shame as I recollect the horrified look of on the dog's face, but it is the pain of that rejection which means that I cannot write a single word more on my chosen subject.



THE MAGNIFICENT SEVEN

- a talk by Jim Stebbings

Jim Stebbings' 'Magnificent Seven' were his favourite creators of American Musical Theatre in the first half of the twentieth century – Jerome Kern, Irving Berlin, Cole Porter, George Gershwin, Frederick Lowe, Richard Rogers and Leonard Bernstein. All seven attributed their interest in music to Gilbert and Sullivan operettas and all but Cole Porter were of European Jewish origin.

Jerome Kern's musical 'Showboat' was ground-breaking in that black and white actors appeared on the stage together and the show tackled gritty issues – race, alcoholism and domestic abuse. In 1917, P.G. Wodehouse collaborated with Kern, writing the lyrics for the song 'Bill'. Kern wrote 700 songs during his career and died in 1945.

Irving Berlin lived to the great age of 101, writing 1500 songs in his long lifetime. His lucky break was with 'Alexander's Ragtime Band' in 1914 and 'Putting on the Ritz', which was written in 1929. But he is best known for writing 'White Christmas' in 1941.

Cole Porter lived from 1891 to 1964. Unlike some of his fellow composers, he came from a wealthy family and studied music at Yale University, being classically trained in violin, piano and composing. Porter wrote both the music and lyrics for his musical theatre hits, one of which was 'High Society'. His songs were often 'edgy'. Porter married, but this was a cover for his homosexuality, the practice of which was illegal in the USA at that time.

George Gershwin's early death from a brain tumour at the age of 38, probably robbed the musical theatre of many more memorable songs. He is best remembered for 'Porgy and Bess', writing the lyrics to his brother's music. He never married.

Richard Rogers wrote such hits as 'Oklahoma', 'Carousel' and 'The King and I', breaking with the tradition of a block-busting opening number by writing 'Oh what a beautiful morning' for 'Oklahoma'. He married in 1930 and had 3 daughters, but was apparently a philanderer who was very unpleasant to his poor wife. He died in 1979.

Leonard Bernstein lived between 1918 and 1990 and is probably best remembered for 'West Side Story', originally conceived as a fight between Catholics and Jews, but changed to the less sensitive rivalry between Latinos and white Americans. Bernstein studied music at Harvard University. His musical talents were wide-ranging as he composed for musical theatre, ballet, opera, wrote chamber music and became the director of the New York Symphony Orchestra. Like Cole Porter, he married as a cover for his homosexuality, leaving his wife and three children to live with a man.

Frederick Lowe lived from 1901 to 1988. He grew up in Berlin where his father was an opera singer. Accompanying his father to America, who was to perform in an opera, he decided to stay – probably just as well as he was Jewish and may not have survived WW2. He his best known for 'My Fair Lady' and 'Camelot', writing the music and collaborating with Alan Lerner, who wrote the lyrics.

Jim Stebbings concluded his talk by mentioning three women who were also significant in the American musical theatre:

Dorothy Fields who wrote the lyrics for 48 musicals;

Agnes de Mille (daughter of Cecil B de Mille), who integrated dance into musicals;

Marli Dixon, whose singing voice was dubbed for various well-known actresses, like Deborah Kerr and Audrey Hepburn.



News from the Surgery

Seasonal Flu Vaccines

Booking is now open for flu clinics – if you are over 65 or 'at risk' you can request to book a flu vaccine by calling Reception after 9:30am.

We have availability on Saturday 7th October and Saturday 4th November. We will also have additional mini clinics running in extended hours in October between 7.30-8.30am and between 6-8pm on days when the surgery is open.

Lenwade have a clinic on Friday 6th October.

Additional clinics will be arranged if you cannot book on these dates.

Patients not 'at risk' including those aged between 50-64 who are not eligible this year, will need to arrange a private vaccine – Mattishall Pharmacy are now taking bookings.

Children eligible to have the nasal flu at the surgery will be invited in September.

Wegovy on the NHS

Unfortunately, there is a worldwide shortage of this class of medicine, and so there is very limited stock available in the UK for use through Tier 3 weight management services only. This means that we are unable to provide prescriptions for Wegovy in primary care, in accordance with NICE guidance.

Donation

We wanted to express our sincere gratitude for the very generous donation received from East Tuddenham Friendship Group who have, sadly, decided to close. The members were very keen to invest the funds raised back into the surgery as a thank you for all the support they have received as patients over the years. We have used the funds to purchase bistro tables and chairs for the staffroom and had great pleasure in inviting Dina and Pearl to show them what we had purchased. The staff are delighted to have a comfortable modern space where they can meet, chat and eat lunch together.

Pharmacy Update

We are working hard to improve services in the Pharmacy. We have several new staff, and it can take us up to 12 months to have them fully trained.

One of our biggest contributors to the queue is patients coming in early to collect medication.

It is currently taking 7 working days to process repeat prescriptions.

We are accepting patients who wish to sign up to our 24/7 collection kiosk.

If the patient has any of the following, they are, unfortunately, unable to have their medication in the machine:-

- 1. Glass/large bottles such as Gaviscon, Peptac , lactulose
- 2. Large heavy creams such as Cetraben, Dermol, Zerobase,
- 3. Large boxes such as Macrogol, Cosmocol, baby milk.
- 4. Large NWOS items
- 5. Supplement drinks
- 6. Fridge Items including inhalers
- Controlled drugs such as Pregabalin, Gabapentin etc. Diazepam/Zopiclone can go in at the discretion of the Pharmacist.
- 8. Any accountable controlled drug
- On our FRPS system (at the moment we are unable to put these in as they would be unable to reorder at the point of collection)
- 10. Has 6 items or more (this would need to be checked due to the size of the items and how many of each)

Robotic Dispenser

We are planning the arrival of our dispensing robot. This is an exciting development for us at Mattishall Surgery and Pharmacy and will help us continue to improve our services.

To accommodate this transition, we will have a complete refit of the Dispensary/Pharmacy and shop premises. To avoid too much disruption we will provide temporary arrangements including a fully fitted dispensary unit.

There will inevitably have an impact on parking and possible restrictions, we are looking at ways we can manage this.

We will provide full details of all the arrangements nearer the time, however below is an overview of our plans:

- Tuesday 3rd to Friday 6th October arrival of temporary dispensing unit and transfer goods.
- Monday 9th October open with temporary arrangements during robot installation, details to be confirmed
- Monday 16th October reopen Dispensary/Pharmacy and shop.

Mattishall & Lenwade Surgeries' Patient Participation Group (PPG)

What is it?

Let's start with the why and when they came into being. In Doctors' surgeries up and down the country, in 2015 under changes made to their contracts (each surgery is a private business contracted by the NHS to provide the service), surgeries were required to form PPGs to provide a means whereby patients could channel their concerns and comments to Practice management about their surgery's performance (and in the case of Mattishall, the pharmacy as well).

The PPG consists of up to 20 members who are either patients registered with the Practice or carers of patients registered with the Practice. They are unpaid volunteers. Their role is to be a "critical friend" to the Practice - to be supporters but as true friends do, be prepared to provide constructive criticism to help them improve their services. The PPG is there to attempt to reflect the views or concerns of the wider patient demographics and therefore the group is dependent on feedback from patients across the service area.

To assist in this task, the group has created its own Facebook page (https://www.facebook.com/profile.php? id=100094978971995) where two-way communication can take place between patients and the PPG.

Information and updates from the Mattishall and Lenwade Surgeries will be posted on a regular basis, and can include latest surgery news, health promotions, and short-notice service changes. Patients can use the forum to communicate their concerns or problems they have endured while accessing Practice and pharmacy services to the group who has access to Senior Management. This facility is not a replacement for a formal complaint which in the very first instance should be directed to the Practice. The group has formal meetings every 3 months, but members have informal contact with each other in between. Our meetings are very informal, we enjoy a cuppa and cake, the cake often home made by one of our group, (Lyn makes great cakes!)


The meetings seem to be quite popular and we are a very friendly group. When we have talked about books the chat can then move on to anything! A good way to meet new people who love books.

Thank you to all litter pickers to date. We have just completed our third litter pick!

18 pickers of all ages pitched in to collect an impressive 9.2kg of rubbish from our streets and footpaths.

So far this year 54 volunteers of all ages have removed around 32kg of litter from our village highways and byways. Not only does this improve the look of our surroundings but more people will litter if there is already rubbish on the ground - so our litter pickers are actively discouraging our less community minded neighbours from spoiling things for us all.

Mattishall Neighbourhood Plan

The Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group has now completed work in identifying fourteen village buildings to be proposed as "non-designated heritage assets". These buildings and monuments have been identified as having a degree of heritage significance meriting consideration in planning decisions but which do not meet the criteria for Listed Buildings. The Steering Group has also identified eight areas of the parish it proposes to designate as "Local Green Spaces". These areas of land are important for their beauty, richness of wildlife, historic significance, recreational value or tranquillity. If ultimately included in the Neighbourhood Plan and accepted by Breckland Council these important sites would be offered greater protection from future development.

The review of the Neighbourhood Plan is progressing well, the next stage will be Regulation 14 consultation when the plan will be submitted to public pre-submission consultation for a minimum period of 6 weeks.

Progress on the Neighbourhood Plan review is discussed each month at our Parish Council public meetings and you'd be more than welcome to attend to find out more. Alternatively just email our Parish Clerk with any questions you might have.

Open Spaces Working Group (OSWG)

The OSWG is comprised of David Piper, Janice Smith, Roisin Murray, Michael Onassis, Anita Rose (all from the Parish Council) and resident Hazel Goodall.

Our remit is to proactively manage the Open Spaces within the Parish of Mattishall, trying to ensure that they are kept in good condition for the benefit of the Parish and reporting on a monthly basis to the Parish Council.

Anyone who wishes to raise an issue should contact the Clerk of the Council in the first place, and she will then decide if this could be dealt with by the OSWG. The principle open spaces that we are concerned with are the Village Green, Allotments, Cemetery and Churchyard, Children's Play Area and Adult Gym.

We are concerned about the tidiness of these areas and work closely with the Clerk and the village handyman to monitor them. Following a crime prevention review by PC Austin Clark and following his recommendation, we have organised the relocation of the outdoor table tennis table from the village green to the school.

We have recently proposed that the allotments are managed by an Allotment Society, which will encompass the allotments at Burgh Lane and the new allotments at the Kingfishers (the Denbury Homes site). We are also supporting the initiation of a Community Allotment at the Kingfishers.

Works to the War Memorial

Following several incidents of vandalism to the village War Memorial the Parish Council has taken police advice and are planning to install a perimeter fence around the structure.

This will be low enough to allow free view of the Memorial and will include lockable access gates that can be opened for maintenance and the laying of wreaths during Remembrance Services.

We welcome feedback regarding this necessary change, please email the clerk with your views for the Council to consider at October's meeting.

Police are urging the public to be vigilant to cold callers claiming to be police officers following 10 incidents in the past week.

10 victims in North Norfolk have received telephone calls from someone claiming to be a police officer. The

caller has told them they have arrested someone who had access to their financial details and to check their cards. The caller also asked about their living situation and belongings. All attempts were unsuccessful.

Courier Fraud happens when a fraudster contacts a victim by telephone claiming to be a police officer, bank or from a government department, among other agencies. A number of techniques will then be adopted in order to convince the victim to hand over their bank details or cash, which may then be passed on to a courier.

The public are reminded that banks and the police will **NEVER** ask someone to withdraw money or purchase items.

Officers have provided the following advice:

- Never give out personal information about your bank account to anybody over the phone. Police and banks will never ask you to give out personal details such as account numbers or PIN numbers.
- If someone calls claiming to be a police officer, ask for their identification number and police force. Hang up and call 101 using a different phone. If you can't use a different phone, wait at least five minutes before calling back. A genuine police officer will not mind waiting while you check.
- Fraudsters will keep the line open and have been known to play ringtones, hold music and a recorded message down the phone so the victim believes they are making a call to a legitimate number. Ensure you can hear a dialling tone before calling police or use a friend or neighbour's telephone instead.
- If you have given out information which could compromise your bank account security in any way, call your bank to cancel your cards as soon as possible.
- Never hand over money to someone at the door to be sent off elsewhere.

We would urge the public to check on their vulnerable friends and family to ensure they are aware of how these scams may operate and how best to protect themselves.

If anyone has received a similar type of telephone call or has any information about these incidents, please contact Norfolk Police on 101 quoting 'Operation Radium'. Alternatively, you can contact Crimestoppers anonymously on 0800 555 111.

Crimestoppers is an independent charity providing the opportunity to report crime 100% anonymously. The charity can be contacted via phone on 0800 555 111 or online at www.crimestoppers-uk.org. Crimestoppers will share this information with Police and other partner agencies to help protect communities and keep people safe.

Mattishall, Shipdham & Watton Neighbourhood Watch Didn't you have a different name before?



Yes, was originally called Mattishall Neighbourhood Watch - I formed the group in October of last year in response to the level of anti-social behaviour and minor crime in the area.

So why the change of name and why are you including other areas?

Since last year, after discussions with Norfolk Neighbourhood Watch and Norfolk Police, it was agreed to create a pilot programme - a collaboration between Norfolk Police and Neighbourhood Watch to provide better communication with collaborative working, including Town and Parish Councils to serve a widely spaced population. If successful, the pilot would be rolled out to other rural areas in Norfolk.

Norfolk is predominately a rural County with a thinly spaced population. Neighbourhood Watch members and followers may not be within a locally based group and, therefore, not have the support of a Neighbourhood Watch Coordinator. Police resources are stretched and local villages may feel that they are not adequately served. The pilot programme hopes to address these concerns by linking a Neighbourhood Watch Coordinator with a Norfolk Police Beat Manager who covers the same area. They work in conjunction with each other to improve the communication links between the Communities and Norfolk Police. As your local Coordinator I can help represent the local villages who may feel that although they may not have the level of crime that the larger towns and city do, they still want a reasonable response to address their particular problems. I attend the Police Priority Setting Meetings, which are held quarterly where I represent our area to ensure we have adequate representation. Currently Norfolk Police are bidding for a Home Office grant of over a million pounds which, if successful, part of which will be used to help this project along.

(Note the area in this pilot consists of I Town Council and 12 Parish Councils - so it's not just Mattishall, Shipdham & Watton - you can appreciate that to include them all in a name would be impractical - names were chosen because they are the Top, Middle and Lower extents of the area but includes surrounding villages).


