# Episode 7. MATTISHALL ROVERS

A few months ago, when I heard it on the grapevine, I found it hard to believe that Mattishall Football Club as a separate entity was no more. It had amalgamated with Bradenham where all the new team's home matches would be played and it seems that the mighty Easton is now playing on the hallowed South Green turf. I don't know any of the ins and outs but reckon it must have been a multi million pound deal in an effort to get financial security and climb up the league ladder. But it left me pondering how could a large and vibrant village like Mattishall not have its own football team? What would the vast horde of supporters think about travelling all the way to the other side of Shipdham to see their team?

Waiting for my prescription in the pharmacy the other week I got talking to Trevor Talbot. We often share our thoughts on football matters and we started reminiscing about the Mattishall FC we grew up with in the 50s and 60s. Trevor was a left back in those days and made appearances for the club before asthma slowed down his burgeoning career. There was a first team and a reserve side playing in the Dereham and District League which meant that virtually every match was a local derby with all the associated tribal rivalry. When I couldn't get to Norwich to watch the Canaries, or if they were playing away, I would queue up to stand on the touchline at Turner's Meadow to watch one of the Mattishall teams. In fact I got quite addicted to the extent that when I left home for College in 1967 my mother would send me a copy of the Dereham and Fakenham Times and I would cut out the league table and stick it on the wall and face the subsequent ridicule of my house mates. I became known (amongst many other things) as "Mattishall Man" because every week in the paper there would be at least one report featuring a "Mattishall man" doing something which warranted a mention due to a heinous crime or getting married or something.

Turner's Meadow was not much like Wembley, apart from the fact that as long as it had rained it was mostly green. It was located in Welgate near the old Congregational Church where houses have now been built. During the week cattle would sometimes be grazing so before a match there was often a cursory attempt to undertake cow pat clearance. But quite honestly, depending on the consistency of the pat and the wetness of the weather, the pats could provide a nice soft landing when sliding in for a tackle.

The teams would change in a corrugated iron hut and don what was then a maroon shirt with yellow trimmings. I don't know when or why the kit was, I think, changed to blue. I liked the maroon and yellow because it was quite similar to the red and yellow kit of Melchester Rovers featured in the Tiger comic where the famed strikers Roy Race and Blackie Gray were instrumental in the Rovers being the most successful club of all time by winning the league and the FA Cup every year during my childhood. In fact I think they're still at it.

There was a pre match ritual during the warm up, repeated at half time, when it seemed most of the players would have a fag. Woodbines were popular. My father used to give me one when I was 14 and I tried so hard to smoke because everybody did it. But despite resorting to menthol flavoured Consulates I could never manage to inhale. What a lucky break that was for me. Think of the fortune I've saved. My father was determined to find a cheap substitute for tobacco to smoke in his pipe to the extent of trying lavender and even sugar beet pulp. Think of the hallucinations that could give you.

The Mattishall teams consisted solely of local lads. None of this stuff about bringing in high profile players from the other side of Dereham. Every village in those days seemed to have a few big families. I remember in particular the Burrell boys from Clint Green. There was John, Stanley, Ray, Gordon, Micky (my best pal at Yaxham Primary School), Steven and I think some girls (I may have missed some out!). They were all salt of the earth characters and good and hard players. When watching the recent Rugby World Cup final it was remarkable that New Zealand fielded three brothers. Well, that's nothing compared to Mattishall when there could be as many as 4 or 5 Burrells playing at the same time.


I particularly remember the goalie "Tarzan" Lancaster who was another from a large family. He lived up to his name being an immense and strong bloke who filled the goal. Anybody jumping for a corner kick with him wouldn't know what hit him.

While the match was being played us younger lads would have our own game on the meadow alongside the pitch using discarded jackets or jerseys to act as goal posts. We'd use a spare football which was a brown all leather affair with stitching which could be opened to reveal the valve used for inflating the bladder. When the ball got wet it soaked up the water and made it very heavy. How anybody managed to kick it for any distance above ground level was a mystery to me - even with the big, studded, clod hopping boots that were worn. And when someone on the main pitch got the ball into the air, or if the goalie fly kicked it forward, you have to hand it to those who unflinchingly headed it, especially if the stitching made contact with your forehead. The number of stars that must have been seen - a bit like smoking sugar beet pulp. One year Mattishall did pretty well in one of the County competitions and had a good cup run. The local interest and excitement was such that a coach was hired to take supporters to an away match as far away as Thorpe which was unheard of. I'm pretty sure we lost, nevertheless it seemed to me that Mattishall was really hitting the big time and before long Europe would beckon.

With all that soccer heritage it begs the question of how can Mattishall do without its own football team? I think I may have come up with a solution. A new team should be formed called Mattishall Rovers. After all the name Mattishall is not that much different to those other fictitious Rovers of Melchester. It has the same number of letters and several common ones. The strip should revert to maroon and yellow and mirror the colours worn by Roy Race and his boys. Someone in the village must have a meadow which could be made available every other Saturday in return for which cow pats would be removed and stored for manure. There must be a few Burrell grandchildren or relations around who could form the core of the team. And the icing on the cake would be a free Woodbine for each player before the game and at half time if requested – failing that a drag on a sugar beet flavoured vape would be made available.

Trevor Talbot can be manager and I'll be coach. I've still got my schooldays Terry Venables football boots hanging in the garage that could do with an airing.

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
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# The Mattishall Society

# END OF AN ERA

Fifty one years ago, Alan James ran one of the two garages in Mattishall. His was on the corner of Dereham Road and Welgate. He and his wife, Marjorie, lived in Orchard House, Welgate and it was Marjorie who started the Mattishall Society.

Initially, the Society was about conservation - planting trees and hedges and keeping a watchful eye on planning applications. My husband, Bill, and I were among the founder members. To raise funds there was a modest membership fee and interesting speakers were engaged for the monthly meetings. When Alan retired, the James's sold up and moved to Shropshire. Alan's garage closed and houses were built on the site and in Orchard House's large garden.

Marjorie would probably have been amazed that the Society continued for fifty one years. But on 13th November, 2023, those members attending the AGM voted unanimously to close the Society. The current committee, (Chris Hawkins, Rita Cooper, Madeleine Fowler, Carol Colledge, Jenny Davies and Paula Hawkins, led by the President and Chairman, Ray Cooper) have served collectively for over eighty years and had decided to stand down. Despite giving a year's warning of this decision, no one came forward to take over, so there was no alternative but to close the Society. At an 'extraordinary' meeting, the outgoing committee will ask members' approval for their proposed disposal of remaining funds, within the Society's constitution.

Having served as Secretary to the Society for three years, written accounts of the many varied speakers for Miscellanea and produced the publicity posters, I shall miss the interesting talks and opportunities to chat with other members but, I suspect that like many others, advancing years and other responsibilities prevented me from offering to serve again. Most members are retired. Sadly, time to move on.

Following the business part of the meeting, Trevor Bliss told the story of helping to save a Vulcan bomber from the scrap yard. It is one of only three remaining in the UK which can power itself down a runway but is not safe to fly. It lives in a hangar at Southend Airport and can be visited on Vulcan Visiting Days. Our short (under 4 miles) walks programme will continue on the first Friday of each month through 2024 and will start at 10:15 unless otherwise advised: the starting point may vary (though will always be near Dereham town centre), so please check on arrangements. Other than that, you don't need to book - just turn up at the right time in the right place. Please note that short walks do not have programmed refreshment stops, but there are usually a number of short halts for people to collect and catch breath, so if you want to bring something to eat and/or drink, there will be opportunity to consume it. The walk will be led at a reasonable pace - we do not rush, but we do need to make progress for the group as a whole; if you have any questions about our speed, please raise them with us. You should come with decent footwear (especially when it's been wet) and suitable clothing.

We are also continuing with our 'Easy Tuesday' walks, with the next on 12 December. As with all of these walks, it will be no more than two miles, on good surfaces and expected to take about an hour. The pace will be steady with regular pauses to catch breath and afterwards there will be an opportunity to have social chat and some refreshments (bring your purse). These walks will continue on the second Tuesday of each month, meeting outside Dads and Lads (Cherry Tree car park) at 10:00. 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# MATTISHALL COMMUNITY HUB

One year on ... and still going strong! When we put on our first, taster, session back in October 2022 we weren't quite sure what response we would get but we needn't have worried. The response has been encouragingly positive and through advertising and 'word of mouth' we now have a regular attendance of around 30 people. Everyone who comes to our free, monthly sessions automatically becomes a member of Mattishall Community Hub and we have now built up a core membership of over 60 local residents - and we hope to welcome many more in the coming year.

In our early days we were very grateful to Mattishall Parish Council for helping to fund our activities. We've also been able to raise additional funds through donations and one-off events (such as the Table Top Sale which we held in September this year, where we did a roaring trade in sausage and bacon butties!). However, we are very pleased to report that we recently, successfully applied to Breckland District Council for a grant as part of the Inspiring Communities initiative. This money will enable us to continue to put on our monthly sessions for another year and help us to provide social and community opportunities to everyone in our village and local surroundings.

For those who aren't quite sure what we're all about, Mattishall Community Hub is a non-profit organisation set up and run, completely voluntarily, by ordinary members of our community to provide a place where local residents can come together to enjoy social contact in a warm and friendly environment. The pandemic showed us just how important human contact is to our wellbeing and that nobody should have to feel isolated or lonely. It's really just about good, oldfashioned neighbourliness - something that is often difficult to maintain in the modern world.

We have one more session this year on Tuesday 5 December which, of course, will have a Christmas theme. The SqueezEast concertina group will, once again, be entertaining us with seasonal music to sing along to and our very own local storyteller, Roisin, will be relating some festive tales. There will be fun Christmas quizzes out on the tables and, as well as our usual refreshments, there will, no doubt, be a mince pie or two!

We will kick off 2004 on Tuesday 6 February when our first session will include a short AGM and from then on we will be holding regular, monthly sessions on the first Tuesday of each month, meeting at Mattishall Memorial Hall. We are also planning to organise more one-off community events next year and would welcome your suggestions. MCH is your community hub and we'd love to have more local residents come and join us in 2004.

### Vaccine Update

Eligible patients that have not yet had a flu jab can contact Reception to arrange an appointment.

This includes anyone over 65 as at 31/3/2024 and patients in 'at risk' categories including some chronic disease patients, carers, household members of immunosuppressed patients and healthcare workers.

All children aged 2/3 are eligible for a nasal flu vaccine at the surgery and all school aged children up to Year 11 are eligible via the school program.

We also offer vaccines against Shingles and Pneumococcal disease at regular mini clinics throughout the year and patients can check their eligibility with Reception staff or when attending for a nurse appointment.

We often invite patients via text message with a link to book an appointment so please make sure we have an up-to-date mobile number recorded on your patient record. It is also helpful to know if you decline any of these vaccines so that we know that you do not want to be contacted further.

If you are contacting Reception regarding vaccinations, please call after 10am to avoid our busiest time.

### PPG

The PPG continue to do great work and support us in many ways, including facilitating a meeting each quarter to discuss updates with members of the practice team. We last met in October and gave an update on our plans and investments to improve efficiencies for our staff and patients. We are looking at ways we can improve communications internally particularly regarding medication queries. We also plan to provide in depth training to upskill our counter staff so they can assist with patient queries.

In my spare time, some of you may have seen me treading the pavements of our lovely village - running, I also love getting my bike out on the road going to some of the amazing places around our area. Over the years I have run the London Marathon three times and done four "100 mile" sponsored cycle rides to raise monies for some very good children's charities.

2 My 2nd choice is **Tiny Dancer** by **Elton John.** This has to be one of my favourite Elton John hits, it was certainly a tough decision as for many years I always stood by "Your Song" as my favourite, but then one day I came across **Tiny Dancer** and my opinion changed straight away! I just loved it as soon as I heard the opening piano melody and then the intriguing lyrics, better still this song always reminds me of my daughter Lily because she used to dance a lot and she likes this song too.

3 My 3rd choice is **Baby I Love You** by **The Ronettes.** To me **The Ronettes** had everything a girl band should have and were amazing to watch perform! From their finesse and amazing bee-hive hair styles to their amazing vocals which, to me, just epitomised a true girl group! It sounds amazing with its powerful backing harmonies and their leading vocals. It is a true credit to their short but phenomenal time as a girl group back in the 60's. Well worth a listen!

4 My next choice is *Heroes* by **David Bowie.** I've always been a big Bowie fan and love his music, this was a hard choice as his catalogue is phenomenal! However, this song *Heroes* really is an outstanding piece of work by the great man himself. Great song by a true legend! 5 My 5th choice is **Everyday is like Sunday** by **Morrissey.** I love listening to the Smiths so was always interested in their lead singer Morrissey's work after they split, he is great entertainment to watch and listen to! I had the pleasure of seeing Mr Mozza in Gt Yarmouth back in 2009 and felt honoured to see this legendary frontman perform at Britannia Pier especially as he cancelled the rest of his tour due to throat problems.

He had done some great solo work in his career but without a doubt this is my favourite right from the opening guitar riff to the very catchy chorus, it's an absolute belter! Wish they played this on the radio more!

6 My 6th choice is **(Forever) Live & Die** by **OMD.** I like a lot of 80s music and bands, but in particular **OMD** who are still around today. They`ve done some really good catchy music over the years but this is a mixture of ballad/synth pop but very catchy and has a really good chorus which drew me to this song.

7 **Ashes** by **Embrace** is my 7th choice. One band I've been to see live quite a bit over the years and who to me has done some superb material, is **Embrace.** Their album "Out of Nothing" is one of my favourite albums and consists of some great songs, including this one **Ashes.** If there's ever a song to lift your spirits and get the crowd going at a gig, then this song definitely does it for me every time I hear it!. Brilliant song from a great band, definitely worth a listen!

8 Song No 8 is **Everyday** by **Slade.** I'm a massive fan of **Slade** and without a shadow of doubt one of my favourite bands of the 70's! Their lead singer Noddy Holder offers so much power in his vocals and certainly adds much character to their superb catalogue. It is such a powerful rock ballad and it just reminds me what a great iconic band they were.

9 My 9th choice is **How soon is now?** by **The Smiths.** As mentioned earlier I love listening to **The Smiths**, an amazing iconic band who sadly parted ways, but had a huge influence on so many bands over the years. Their music catalogue is phenomenal along with some great albums and front covers too! The song **How soon is now?** does it for me every time I hear it! The rest of the term is equally as busy as we try our hand at making Christmas cakes and have a fun outing to Quasar. Everyone will definitely need a rest!

Scouts: Two teams of scouts took part in the District Team Challenge Hike in October near Marham. They had to navigate between check points, completing team challenges at each one. This gave all those taking part an opportunity to push themselves to walk all day in unfamiliar territory and to work together on the activities. Scouts have also been working to complete their Pioneering Badge by building basic ballistas. At half-term, scouts enjoyed a camp at Garvestone where they managed to cook their dinner on open fires, despite the rather wet weather, improved their tomahawk skills and explored the local area.

Inspired by 'Where the Wild Things Are' by Maurice Sendak, Reception created their own 'Wild Thing' puppets. They explored different vocabulary to describe the wild things from the book and created their own puppet show to role-play as their 'Wild Thing' characters.

The Year 1 classroom became a crime scene. The animals from the book 'Cave Baby' by Julia Donaldson had escaped. The children had to identify the animal footprints and create some wanted posters.



While looking at still life art, Year 2 conducted a colour study trying to create all the colours in the piece of art they were studying.



In Science Year 3 looked at healthy diets, performing an experiment to compare the fattiness of different foods. They made predictions of what foods had the most fat in them and then ranked these from 5 (having the most) to 1 (having the least).

As part of their History Topic 'Invasion', Year 4 visited West Stow Anglo-Saxon Village. They explored different buildings, the museum and handled some original and replica objects, discussing their possible significance or use. They tried on some Anglo-Saxon clothing and gathered in the Hall and asked excellent questions of the Village expert.



Year 5 investigated the effects of air resistance by making their own parachutes using different materials and testing how effective they were. They changed the canopy shape and size to see if this made a difference and timed how long it took for the parachute to reach the ground from a set height.

Year 6 learnt about the circulatory system. They tested different ways to find their heart rate and used this to test the hypothesis: Children with lower resting heart rates can sprint faster than those with higher resting heart rates. Using the data collected, the children will create scatter graphs to see if there is a correlation.





# A message from the Headteacher – Mr Chapman

We have had a really busy Autumn term and over the last few months have recruited six new members of staff. We have had children taking part successfully in Norfolk schools sporting competitions such as Cross Country and Tag Rugby; we have reintroduced trips to help enrich the curriculum; and our Year 4 children recently went to West Stow to look at the reconstructed Anglo-Saxon settlement. We also have several clubs ongoing, which are well attended. These include bell ringing and dodgeball and more are planned for the New Year.

To support the development of curriculum areas, we are looking for local people who can come into school and talk to children about their professions, helping also to raise aspirations. Previously we have had a dental nurse, a vet, a GP, a member of the police, an author and illustrator, and someone from the Fire Service. Please contact Mrs Findlay via the school office if you are interested or know of anybody who can support this.

We have recruited a lot of new reading volunteers who attend our school on a weekly basis to support children with reading development. We really appreciate their support and the children they work with get that little bit of extra time reading 1:1 and discussing the texts, allowing them to have a deepened understanding and to develop a love of books.

Our fundraising team have also been successful, organising

a pumpkin carving competition and a school disco. They are currently organising our highly rated Christmas raffle. You are more than welcome to purchase tickets from us. Please contact the school office for more information.





Well, the nights are drawing in and the weather has certainly turned. Shop window displays are full of enticing gifts, seasonal light displays are being turned on in our towns – it can only mean one thing – we are fast approaching the Christmas season! In these final weeks of the year many of us will be purchasing gifts for friends and family to open on Christmas Day and these items, often expensive, are a target for opportunist thieves. With this in mind, Norfolk Constabulary have launched our "Keep It Christmas" campaign. This crime prevention campaign encourages Norfolk residents to protect themselves, their family, friends, and property during this time of the year but also reminds potential perpetrators of the consequences of illegal actions during the festive period. Here are some of our top tips to having a safe and crime-free Christmas this year:

 When going on your Christmas shopping trips be careful where you park your car. Try to choose a well-lit space covered by CCTV and if possible, avoid dropping purchases off at your car mid-way through your shopping trip. If you must return to your vehicle mid-shop to drop off shopping, make sure it is stored out of sight in the boot and make sure you lock and secure your vehicle when you leave it. Keep it hidden, #KeepitChristmas.

- Drink spiking is a serious crime with serious consequences. Don't spend Christmas behind bars. Keep it out, #KeepitChristmas.
- Don't leave presents under the Christmas Tree if they are visible from windows and doors, and for gifts you want to keep hidden until the big day, keep them in a secure place and avoid sheds or garages. Make sure your windows and doors are locked whenever you leave the house this winter and at night to keep others out. Take care about what you post on social media. Try not to advertise expensive gifts you have purchased/received and don't broadcast when you are going to be away from your home. Keep it locked, #KeepitChristmas.
- Had a few drinks last night? Don't take any risks, you might still be over the limit today. Drink driving is a serious crime with serious consequences. When planning social events arrange for a designated driver. Keep it cautious, #KeepitChristmas.

# The Retired Librarian

Well, it's beginning to look a lot like Christmas and unusually, this year, it comes without the burden of Christmas shopping. Not even a cocktail sausage, for Robin and I are being entertained by his lovely sister and family. Not for me the trawling of the supermarkets for vegan or gluten-free goodies, I have a year off. Neither do I need to buy presents other than the obligatory bottle for the hostess, as we haven't exchanged gifts for many a year. I'm quite heady with power.

Naturally, things were different when I was a child and presents featured large. I can honestly say that during my early years, I did love a good doll. That's not to say that I didn't receive many guns and related armaments, though never a Tommy gun which I craved. I had pistols and six shooters, bows and arrows and one Christmas a cool Man from UNCLE target set. I could be Napoleon Solo or Ilya Kuryakin according to my whim and shoot down THRUSH from the TV set. My poor, beleaguered husband played the same game with two friends and was relegated to reserve so never got to play the main characters, a point that still rankles. I was quite the tomboy then and to be honest, in today's climate, the powers that be would have had me in breast binders before you could say Trans Exclusionary Radical Feminist. But I digress, dolls...

My first doll was a lovely plastic baby complete with crib and a whole wardrobe of hand knitted clothes, courtesy of my industrious mother and grandmother. I absolutely doted on him (all my doll babies were boys) and dressed and redressed him until the clothes became rags. I never gave him a name. That soon changed when the Christmas I was six, I received a huge box containing a white-suited 'real' hair doll called Jonathan...it said so on the box. He was fashioned into a cuddle position and would sit astride my hip perfectly. I did take my old doll to one side and explain carefully that he had not been replaced, that he would always be my first doll, as I put him away. Jonathan remained my greatest present for a while and was the reason I named my first son Jonathan. That two other Jonathans were in the same school year as he was in sixth form, was either coincidence or the other mothers had been given the same doll at six. He, the doll, not my son, eventually ended up being scalped by my naughty little sister, and yes, she was.

By this time, I was playing with other little girls who had their own dolls, I went to Susan Hill's house up our road and would be allowed to hold her Teeny Tiny Tears. I longed for a Tiny Tears, but apparently, I had enough. Julie next door had a Hamble from Playschool and I thought she was adorable to cuddle, soft-bodied and all. Kim Goldspink had a Sindy doll and I managed to pick up a Paul from a school jumble sale. I was elated when she agreed to swap my Paul for her real hair version. My new Paul had a very cool brown suede jacket that fit Sindy too. We played for hours on her bedroom floor. I never had a Barbie, but did get instead, a Tressie whose hair could extend through a hole in her head. Nobody wanted to swap her, and she fell out of favour quite quickly.

In between Pauls, I had a ragdoll called swinging Kate. I would literally swing her around by her long cloth arms, less so my daughter of the same name. Uniquely, among

my friends I also had a ventriloquist dummy by the name of Titch, as in Titch and Quackers. Ray Allen was the puppet master on television who performed largely with a doll called Lord Charles, a monocle -wearing toff. Titch was a schoolboy complete with uniform blazer and tie. I couldn't throw my voice and never got beyond "gottle of gear" but loved playing with him despite his having a hole in his back. I would still tuck him up in bed at night.

One of the best dolls though was my Action Man. It cost twenty-one and six! It took weeks of saving my one shilling a week pocket money, many books of Green Shield stamps and a well-trodden ten-shilling note picked up from a puddle outside the fish shop, before I could afford it. Even then I asked Stephen Sillett to go in and buy it for me from Selina's toy shop, as I was too embarrassed to go in myself. The clever thing about getting an Action Man was that my parents were never short of present ideas because you could buy numerous outfits and equipment for it. I particularly enjoyed the husky pulled sled and white parka combination one Christmas and was entertained by a German soldier uniform and accompanying rifle and anti-tank mines. I'm sure I haven't made that up.

Naturally, as I got older my thoughts and dreams turned to other things. I was desperate for a Sasha doll, but they were five pounds. They still sell for hundreds second hand, but they were way out of my young reach. Fancy having a doll that was wearing towelling mules. Bliss, but not to be. Soon, I was hoping for record albums and books for Christmas and dolls fell out of favour, but for a long while, they were cool and played with all the time. I think they set me in good stead for being a mother, if all I had to worry about was dressing the children.

None of them ever had a white parka.

### On the road with the AA Part 1



I arrived in Norfolk on the 9th May 1983 for a job interview with the Automobile Association. The journey from my home in North Yorkshire was a long one, but it was worth it. I had been a Breakdown and Recovery Patrol Officer for six years,

and felt that it was time to move on. The Superintendent who interviewed me agreed, and I was offered the job of District Sergeant, working under the local Inspector.

By late June, I was in the county learning the job and getting to know the Patrols on my team. I was also house hunting, and sometime in August I arrived in Mattishall one morning and stopped at the garage on Dereham Road, at the junction with Welgate. There was a mechanic at the petrol pumps, and I asked him where I could find Gregs Close. He told me - and forty years later I'm still here! But the garage and petrol pumps have gone, along with a number of other shops and facilities.

The village was perfect for our needs; my wife was pleased that there was a first and middle school, a surgery, Post Office and a good selection of shops.

My new job involved several areas of responsibility: Health and Safety, discipline, vehicle maintenance, performance targets and a few others, like emptying AA telephone boxes of cash. In those days, before mobile 'phones, the boxes were well used and it was the Sergeant's job to drive around the allocated area, picking up the cash and banking the proceeds. My boxes were in North Norfolk. There were three: one near Langor Bridge garage on the A1067, near Pensthorpe. Another on the A148 south of Sheringham, near Sheringham Park, and the third one at Hevingham on the A140.


One day the Inspector took me on the route, so I would get to know my way around. We left the depot at Bowthorpe, in Norwich one morning, and arrived back late in the afternoon. The Inspector was not one to rush about. He was in his later years, and had been in the job for a long time. We arrived at Langor Bridge and I emptied the box. As we drove towards Sheringham, he diverted onto a minor road leading to a track and a remote farm. Here, he had a long chat with the farmer, and eventually we left with a selection of vegetables, which he had purchased at a 'good price'.

After emptying the box at Sheringham Park, we diverted again, this time into Sheringham itself, and we had lunch at 'The Lobster' near the sea front. On we went to Hevingham, and then to a bank in Norwich, so that he could sort out his finances, and I could pay in the cash from the telephones. On future trips I found that the total journey took in the region of two hours or so - not all day!

After that it was back to the office at the Transport Depot at Bowthorpe, and then some planning for another day out picking up stores and equipment, from our other depot at Peterborough.

we got chatted up in the queue, what we would have been wearing, with dressing up as well provided by the wonderful Angela Bishop who brought the session to us.


Stories shared and memories relived. Smiles on faces as we left.

The Parish Council has now launched an eight week consultation (known as Regulation 14) to allow everyone to have their say on the future of Mattishall.

The Neighbourhood Plan is a document used by Breckland Council when making decisions on planning applications. It contains 25 policies which focus on the environment; Housing; Community; Economy and Transport. Alongside the Neighbourhood Plan, a detailed Design Guide has been prepared to help ensure new development is well designed and appropriate to our village.

### WE NEED YOUR HELP TO PROTECT MATTISHALL FROM FLOODING AND THE EFFECTS OF CLIMATE CHANGE

Do you know what Riparian Rights and Responsibilities are?

If a watercourse/ditch is shown as being part of your property on deeds or Land Registry map then it is **your responsibility** to properly maintain it. However, if any of your land borders a natural watercourse, has natural water running through or under it, or you have a ditch adjacent to your property you are likely to be a Riparian Rights owner. Under Riparian Rights, you may be surprised by the extent of your responsibilities and why it is extremely important you adhere to them.

Being aware of your responsibilities under Riparian Rights, and those of your neighbours, would be prudent and would allow you to protect not just your property but that of your neighbours as well from the risk of flooding. These are only some, but not all, of your responsibilities under Riparian Rights:

**YOU MUST ALLOW** the water to flow naturally and keep the watercourse clear of debris at all times.

**YOU MUST MAINTAIN** the bed and banks and any trees & vegetation thereon.

YOU MUST NOT alter or block or obstruct the watercourse in any way

**YOU MUST NOT** increase the risk of flooding and erosion for you or your neighbours land.

YOU MUST NOT pollute the water

It is important that WE ALL take the necessary steps possible to help minimise the risks of flooding in Mattishall. By working together, we can achieve this and also help offset the effects of climate change. Failure to acknowledge your duties under Riparian Rights could lead to prosecution if you do not carry out your legal responsibilities. Additional information is available here:

# St Andrew – Patron Saint of Scotland and so much more

Scotland celebrates St Andrew's Day on 30th November but St Andrew is also the patron saint of Russia, Romania, Ukraine and Barbados. Apart from these countries, he is the patron saint of Amalfi in Italy, Patras in Greece and Esqueira in Portugal among others and patron saint of singers, spinsters, maidens, fishmongers, fishermen, women wanting to be mothers, gout and sore throats.

Andrew was a fisherman before he and his brother Simon Peter became two of the 12 disciples of Jesus. He was baptised by John the Baptist and was the first disciple of Jesus. In the Greek Orthodox tradition, he is known as "Prōtoklētos" ( $\Pi \rho \omega \tau \circ \kappa \lambda \eta \tau \circ \varsigma$ ) - literally "the first-called". Andrew was born in Bethsaida, in Galilee, which is now Israel. He was crucified on 30th November 60 AD, by order of the Roman governor Aegeas. He was tied to an X-shaped cross in Greece, and this is represented by the white cross on the Scottish flag, the Saltire, since at least 1385.

His remains were moved 300 years after his death to Constantinople, now Istanbul, by the Emperor Constantine. While he was generally revered in Scotland from around 1,000 AD, he didn't become its official patron saint until the signing of the Declaration of Arbroath in 1320. Legend has it that St Andrew's first relics ended up in Scotland thanks to St Rule or St Regulus, a Greek monk who had a vision in which he was told to take them to the ends of the earth for safekeeping. His journey took him to the shores of Fife, where St Andrews now stands.



There are many legends relating to St Andrew but the following is one of the more popular ones. In AD 832 Óengus II led an army of Picts and Scots into battle against the Angles, led by Æthelstan, near modern-day Athelstaneford, East Lothian. The legend states that he was heavily outnumbered and hence whilst engaged in prayer on the eve of battle, Óengus vowed that if granted victory he would appoint St Andrew as the patron saint of Scotland. On the morning of battle white clouds forming an X shape in the sky were said to have appeared. Óengus and his combined force, emboldened by this apparent divine intervention, took to the field and despite being inferior in numbers were victorious. Having interpreted the cloud phenomenon as representing the crux decussata upon which St Andrew was crucified, Öengus honoured his pre-battle pledge and duly appointed St Andrew as the patron saint of Scotland. The white saltire set against a celestial blue background is said to have been adopted as the design of the flag of Scotland on the basis of this legend.

A local superstition uses the cross of St Andrew as a hex sign on the fireplaces in northern England and Scotland to prevent witches from flying down the chimney and entering the house to do mischief. By placing the St Andrew's cross on one of the fireplace posts or lintels, witches are prevented from entering through this opening. In this case, it is similar to the use of a witch ball, although the cross will actively prevent witches from entering, and the witch ball will passively delay or entice the witch, and perhaps entrap it.

Despite the fact that St Andrew has stood as Scotland's patron saint for so many years, it wasn't until the 18th Century that the popular celebration of his day became commonplace. The tradition of celebrating on 30th November was not even technically started in Scotland, but by a group of ex-pats in the USA who were keen to reconnect with their Scottish roots. More recently, St Andrew's Day has become more and more special to Scots and each year on 30th November, people across the country gather together to celebrate St Andrew and share good times. The day is usually marked with a celebration of Scottish culture, including dancing, music, food and drink, with parties going on long into the cold winter night.

Here are some Scottish sayings to get your tongue round:

- Gonnae no' dae that! Don't do that
- Yer bum's oot the windae You're talking rubbish
- Am a pure nick I don't look very presentable
- Ah umnae I am not
- Ma heid's mince My head's a bit mixed up
- Yer oot yer face! You're very drunk
- Yer aff yer heid You're off your head a little bit daft
- I'll gie ye a skelpit lug! I'll slap your ear
- Whit's fur ye'll no go by ye! What's meant to be will be
- Lang may yer lum reek! Live long and stay healthy

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
