Just a bit of history...

The 466th Bomber Command was stationed nearby at Attlebridge (actually Frans Green the other side of the A47). They played a big part in the D-Day raid. The 466th Bomber Command lost 333 service men, with 171 taken Prisoners of War from March 22nd 1944 to April 25th 1945. Some of the American service men often visited Mattishall on a weekly basis to attend the Methodist Church and other facilities. A few of the church members opened their homes after the services and shared what little food

they had for supper, rationing was in place but the American's embraced the hospitality. My wife's Grandparents house, became a main meeting place until the Americans returned home and the airfield was turned into a POW camp. Over that time lasting friendships were formed, friendships which went on through to their children, even to this day. The American service men would bring sweets and chocolates and other goodies for the children which at that time were things many children could only then dream of.

On August 18th 1944, following the attacks the Americans opened their gates for a dance in the Northern Hanger. It is said over 10,000 people danced to the live music of Glenn Miller and his band who had flown in (Glenn Miller was killed the following December). They were accompanied by Rudy Starita's Orchestra and film star Col. James Stewart - just another little snippet, Glenn Miller said he didn't want any pictures taken, however, Capt. John Woolnough talked him into one so he could send it home to his brother and, so this did not create a precedent, the only place they could find unnoticed was the toilets!! MCH launched a bright, new look at the first session of the year in February. Our eye-catching logo, designed in collaboration with MCH members Martin Dacre and Hazel Goodall, represents the hub of the community 'wheel' and we hope that it will soon become a familiar sight around the village and on social media.

It was great to see so many people at our February meeting as we also held our very first AGM. The agenda included reflecting on how the project has been going since our initial taster sessions back in October 2022 and looking forward towards our plans for taking MCH into 2024 – and beyond! We were very pleased to welcome Breckland Community Enabler, Lorraine Varney, who is a great supporter of MCH as well as hearing from MCH member, Hazel Goodall, about the proposed Mattishall Community Allotment. We hope that MCH will be able to link in with this worthwhile project as it develops. We also held a raffle raising a splendid £75.00 to donate to the fund for the Memorial Hall's new Play Area which will be a great addition to the village.

We are very excited about the possibilities that lie ahead for MCH especially as we have now secured funding from Breckland Council's Spark Fund and, more recently, the National Lottery's Awards for All. Also, while we were saddened to learn that The Mattishall Society has come to an end after serving the village for over 50 years – an amazing achievement - we are extremely grateful that they have kindly chosen to include us in their donations to local community projects.

Over 80 people have now attended at least one of our sessions and we have a regular attendance of around 25-30. We hope to reach more people in the coming months with plans for a leaflet distribution but we also rely on word of mouth so, please, do spread the word!. As well as our regular social sessions we have organised The Big Afternoon Tea for the King's Coronation, a Table Top Sale, a fund-raising event for Breast Cancer Now as well as two Christmas special sessions with seasonal stories from member Roisin Murray and music from members Sally & Paul Barrett and SqueezEast.

Now we just need to know what other community events our local residents would like to see in the village that we might be able to facilitate. We would really like to encourage all ages so any suggestions will be very helpful. Following the AGM, we have set up a 'Volunteer Bank' as, although the new funding will enable us to organise more community projects and events in the future, we will also need more 'hands on deck' to make them a success. If you would like to join our list of willing volunteers, please email us, we'd be thrilled to have you!

MCH's next major event will be as part of the whole village commemoration of the 80th D-Day Anniversary on Sunday 9 June. Plans are in progress but we can safely say that tea and cake will be involved! We really hope to see a big turnout on the day so, please, make sure that you put the date in your diaries. Meanwhile, for anyone who may be lonely, isolated, bored or would like to meet more Mattishall (and nearby)

residents, our usual sessions continue with free refreshments, fun quizzes, Give & Take Table (swap one item e.g. plant book, puzzle etc. for one other item on the table - optional) and lots of chat! We normally meet on the first Tuesday of every month but our next session will be on Tuesday 9 April to avoid being too close to Easter. You'll be assured of a very warm welcome but If you haven't been before and feel unsure, please, do email us and let us know how we can help.



Episode 7 THANK YOU FOR THE MUSIC

John Norton

My love affair with music began in the mid 1950s when, as a 7-year-old, I learnt to wind up our gramophone and play my dad's 78 rpm records. I was intrigued. My favourites were songs from the deep south of the USA by people like Paul Robeson. "Ol' Man River" and "Lazybones" remain in my top 100. This was really an early introduction to blues music which has been a constant source of solace ever since. I still have my father's collection of some two hundred 78s. The question is what to do with them now that I've run out of needles.

My elder sister got me into the new fangled Rock 'n Roll much to my mother's disgust and I was infatuated by the Buddy Holly, Bill Haley and early Elvis era. I still vividly remember the outpouring of grief in 1959 "the day the music died" when Buddy was killed in an air crash.

By 1960 vinyl 45 rpm single records and "long players" had arrived and the family collection began. Roy Orbison's "Crying" album became a constant on our brand new record player which could play a stack of 10 singles one after the other. The first single I bought was "Brown Eyed Handsome Man" by the now deceased Buddy Holly. That began a few years of going to a record shop in Dereham on a Saturday and spending pocket money and income from blackcurrant picking on buying singles at 6s and 8 pence each which worked out at three for a pound. Yes, it taught you maths as well.

By 1964 the 60s pop music boom was at its peak abetted by the wonderful pirate radio stations. Radios Caroline, London and 390 became a staple diet replacing the likes of Jimmy Savile, of all people, on Radio Luxembourg. The pirates broadcast from small ships wallowing in the North Sea off the Essex coast while Radio 390, which had its home on an old fort in the Thames estuary, had the Sunday evening Mike Raven Blues Show which has never been surpassed. Pop music touring theatre shows and outdoor festivals became the rage. I believe the Beatles came to Norwich. I saw a show featuring Gene Pitney and various top groups at the Gaumont in the city - but you couldn't hear anything above the screaming of hyper-excited girls. Earlham Park in Norwich and The Netheard in Dereham hosted outdoor shows which featured groups like Gladys Knight and the Pips and Georgie Fame and the Blue Flames. I always fancied being a "Pip" and doing the "oooh, oooh" bit in the "Last Train to Georgia".

At my all-boys school in Swaffham, a couple of us decided to do a pop music survey for the school magazine asking pupils and masters alike who was their favourite group. The result was a dead-heat for first place between The Beatles and The Rolling Stones and it's incredible to think that 60 years later they would still probably be high in the rankings. The best answer in our survey was from "George" Malkie, the Latin and Religious Instruction teacher, who chose The Amadeus String Quartet as his favourite! We collapsed laughing.

By this time some of the cool boys a couple of years older had started going to the Orford Cellar in Norwich which became a trendy place for music lovers. It was similar in size (i.e. crammed and small) as the Cavern Club in Liverpool. It focused on rhythm and blues and groups like the marvellous Graham Bond Organisation, which included Ginger Baker and Jack Bruce (later of Cream), would be playing. My mates and I really felt we'd arrived when we went to the Orford.

But you didn't need to travel all the way to Norwich because the music scene had truly arrived in good old Dereham. The Sunshine Rooms dance hall which was situated beneath the cinema, became the venue for the famed Tavern (later renamed the Wellington) Club. Sunday nights were never the same again. For several years it hosted a mixture of high calibre soul, pop, rock and psychedelic acts. Geno Washington and the Ram Jam Band and Jimmy James and the Vagabonds were regulars on the soul scene, supplemented by classy Americans like Lee Dorsey (remember "Ride your pony"?). Following in the footsteps of The Rolling Stones I think Geno, who was a locally stationed American GI, and Jimmy James are still going strong. Chart topping groups like The Small Faces would appear and, unbelievably for little ol' Dereham, super groups like Cream and Pink Floyd played there. I remember standing 6 inches away from Eric Clapton's amplifier (my hearing has never fully recovered). Reflecting the hippy psychedelic era which had arrived, Pink Floyd, who had already had their first No 1, put on a light show. Not quite the illuminations seen in vast stadium shows of later years but the lighting effect was created by coloured oils being spread between two pieces of glass and then displayed through a slide projector which created all sorts of weird moving colours. Groovy man! It was more than enough to mesmerise us. Free buses were laid on from nearby places like Watton to take teenagers to Dereham for the shows. Unfortunately Mattishall missed out on this and I had to resort to my bike. Depending on who was appearing some of us would wear a parka coat if it was a mod group like the Small Faces, a fake leather jacket if it was more heavy rock, flares and flowers if it was hippy focused and occasionally a pair of sunglasses because we thought it looked good. Remember these were the days of mods and rockers and there would sometimes be confrontations outside the Harlequin coffee bar next to the Market Place. continued on next page...

1967, the year I left school, was a highlight. A few of us in our year had created an event-arranging organisation which we called PSI Promotions. I better not let on what PSI stood for, apart from the P being for Psychedelic. We organised a hippy, flowered-themed school summer dance to follow on from an extremely successful crisp eating competition and other events which had taken place earlier in the year. The support act was a local ginger-haired Bob Dylan (my hero) influenced performer who called himself Jonas D Chord. The group who were the main act were late and we managed to negotiate a 50% reduction in the fee we paid. A fantastic night - with plenty of girls from Dereham High School and Swaffham Convent School attending. Various couples were caught in compromising situations throughout the school grounds, the head master's study being one of them. In hindsight it was a good job we were leaving.

On top of that The Who appeared at West Runton Pavilion. My claim to fame is that there was a call for the owner of a mini-van numbered 7827 VF (which was me) to move it as it was blocking Roger Daltrey's Bentley. I had just passed my test and had bought the car for £75. Mr Daltrey looked well impressed.

But to cap it all, the one off, brilliant, greatest guitarist of all time, Jimi Hendrix had appeared at the Orford in Norwich and a few weeks later in October he was coming to The Wellington Club in Dereham! I left home to go to College in September and couldn't get back for the Hendrix show because the minivan had already broken down. Something I still regret to this day..... but what an incredible legacy for Dereham.

I have also been to America to see "The Carla Project. I say "been" figuratively. Carla lives in Los Angeles in a one-bedroom apartment and posts videos of her staying on top of her stuff and cleaning her small space. She also loves to help friends to declutter by gentle encouragement and physical help. She does not espouse the Marie Kondo method which asks you to hold up an object and determine whether it "sparks joy" before you keep it, but suggests you need a better reason than inertia. She has posted a series of videos in which she helps her own sister to clear out her hoarded, prepper home. She has amassed stuff ready for the breakdown of civilisation and the apocalypse in her home and recognises it as a mistake and needs help to get rid of the mostly expired foodstuffs. She is also an addictive spender, and her space is invaded by too many purchases. Much is donated to charity, and some sold on the kerb side, but the relief she feels after a good clear out is palpable.

There are many other decluttering videos available to view. The Space Saver Method, the Dorman family and One Day at a Tidy to name just three. that her naturally messy self has trouble keeping on top of her chores. She makes motivational videos of her cleaning and tidying her space and the spaces of family members. Her narration is wonderfully appropriate and delves into the psychology of mess and cleanliness.

Or go to Hobart, Tasmania and George who mows lawns and cuts down trees for folk who don't or can garden themselves. He traverses his neighbourhood seeking out land that needs taming and volunteers his services. Flawless cleaning will do the same in the southeast of England and all for free. These people are unsung heroes, but my absolute favourite must be Midwest Magic Cleaning. Based in Illinois, America, Mac is a colossus in the world of hoarder houses. He is autistic and derives great personal satisfaction out of bringing order to chaos, hope to despair. He is not sponsored by any company but will recommend cleaning products that he uses. His voiceovers are a masterclass in human psychology and quirkiness. He has studied hoarder disorder at length and is well informed. He never makes fun of the people he helps (again, free of charge) but is supportive and non-judgemental. I look forward to his weekly posts.

So, you see, I do get out really. I just don't have to leave the room to do it.

As I said in Part 1, the AA Depot was located on Bowthorpe Industrial Estate in Norwich. It contained a workshop for the servicing and repair of the large fleet of

vehicles that were deployed in Norfolk. This included large and small breakdown vans, and large recovery vehicles used for long distance jobs. In the adjoining part of the building were the admin offices, the AA Signs Department, the AA Members waiting lounge and the workshop supervisor's office.

As a Sergeant, duties were normally of a mobile nature, but on a rotating basis with the other Sergeants, I found myself behind the office desk keeping an eye on things and catching up on paperwork.

One morning I was with another Sergeant, mulling over some problem or other, when a large articulated lorry drove into the yard. The driver climbed out of his cab and came over to the office. I said 'Hello', and asked him how we could help. He said that he had a delivery to make in the city, but he was having trouble finding the location. He handed the invoice to my colleague, saying that he'd had a long drive from York that morning and needed a break.

Suddenly my colleague burst out laughing uncontrollably and passed me the invoice. I was puzzled, wondering what could be funny about this? As I read the delivery address, it suddenly became clear. It was poorly handwritten, and the letter 'N' in Norwich was actually the letter 'H', meaning that the driver should have been in Horwich, near Manchester. Instead, he was about 200 miles out of his way. When he realized his mistake, he turned white and had to sit down. We gave him a brew and let him use our phone to ring his boss to let him know that he'd be rather late getting back!

That story is a true one, as is the next one. It concerns a lost holiday maker who asked me for directions. I had stopped at the Easton garage for petrol and was about to leave when a car pulled up and the driver approached and asked if I could help him. THE NATIONAL TRUST'S OXBURGH HALL



About 8pm on an August night in 2016, one of the Victorian dormer windows slid from the roof into the courtyard of Oxburgh Hall. The Hall had to be closed to the public whilst the other 13 dormer windows were inspected and it transpired than none of them was properly keyed into the roof!

The next step was to send up a drone to inspect the roof as a whole. This revealed that the 27 Victorian chimneys were cracked and moving in the wind! It was clear that the whole roof needed urgent attention. However, as Oxburgh is a Grade 1 listed building, scaffolding cannot be directly attached to it. This was not such a problem in the courtyard as in the moat. It was not possible to drain the moat as this would expose the clay on which the house sits. If the clay dried out, the house would collapse.

Work could begin in the courtyard, but low level experimental scaffolding, anchored with sandbags was put into the moat and left for some months to see if it shifted. It didn't, so further storeys could be added.

Of course, the disaster didn't end there! Deathwatch beetle was found in the roof, along with rare species of protected bats, which could not be re-homed. All in all, this repair work, which began with one dormer window, created a 6 year project of restoration costing £6.3million.

Despite its fortified appearance, Oxburgh Hall was intentionally built as a family home. It was completed in 1482 for Sir Edmund Bedingfeld and the Catholic Bedingfeld family has lived there ever since, surviving Civil War, periods of near dereliction, and, in the 20th century, the threat of demolition.

Yes, the threat of demolition..........After World Wars I and II, many large country houses fell into disrepair. Many of their staff had died in the wars. The potential work-force was not there and/or had moved on to other better paid work in factories and other industries. In addition, death duties and other taxes proved too much for some families. A large number of such houses were sold off for demolition. After the incumbent Baronet at Oxburgh had sold off nearly all the 4000 acres of the estate and was still in debt, he put Oxburgh Hall up for sale. However, the auctioneer tasked with the sale did not feel comfortable with selling to the only person who offered the asking price of £5,000 – a

builder whose intention it was to dismantle the Hall and sell off the building materials, fire places and fittings. The auctioneer contacted the Baronet's mother, Lady Sybil Bedingfeld, who lived in London. It became clear that she did not know of the impending sale. She, her daughter and her niece sold their London houses to raise the necessary £5000, bought the house in 1951 and gifted it to the National Trust the following year, on the understanding that the family could continue to live there.

The restoration project involved various elements:

- 1. The black-glazed roof pantiles were in need of repair, bought by the 4th Baronet to replace the originals in the 1770s. At the time of purchase, he noted he required 50,000 pan-tiles and 800 ridge-tiles from Holland. Many were now weatherworn, cracked and damaged. So, 14,000 new black-glazed pantiles were made for the roof. However, they proved a little too slippery for the bats whose home in the roof had to be preserved. Jane Harris, the NT bat expert, carried out a test, which found that a special bat friendly coating of paint mixed with sand, ensured that the bats can grip on and climb the tiles with their tiny claws, to reach the openings of their new roost.
- 2. 27 elaborate chimneys stand tall (if somewhat wonky) on the roof of Oxburgh Hall. The chimneys resemble those which graced Mattishall's Victorian School and which now flank the war memorial on the Village Green. Each chimney at Oxburgh was of a different design. Luckily, the supplier of the original chimneys, Bulmer Brick and Tile Company, is still in business and still has the moulds from which the chimneys' bricks were made. They recreated 12,000 new bricks for the chimneys.

 3. The 14 dormer windows, of varying shapes and sizes, all needed dismantling and rebuilding.

All this was made possible thanks to a grant from the Heritage Stimulus Fund, part of the Culture Recovery Fund, which is administered on behalf of the government by Historic England, as well as support from The National Lottery Heritage Fund, thanks to money raised by National Lottery players. The Wolfson Foundation has also lent its generous support as has the European Agricultural Fund for Rural Development through the LEADER programme, the Sylvia Waddilove Foundation UK and The Constance Travis Charitable Trust. It's also thanks to many NT members and other visitors who donated to the roof appeal or supported the project through visiting or spending money in the tea-room, shop and bookshop.

Oxburgh Hall has now reopened – the scaffolding is down and the house is open to visitors. Sadly, because of Health and Safety, it will no longer be possible to climb to the roof. However, the Catholic Bedingfeld's 'priest hole' can still be viewed in the King's chamber. **Anna English**



Reflecting on Mattishall's Past with Ray Taylor

DID YOU KNOW – Mattishall once had more than EIGHT Public Houses! The last to survive is the SWAN, the picture below was taken from All Saints tower. The wooden building to its right, on the corner of Burgh Lane, was Mattishall's Village Hall, known as Odd Fellows Hall, now the site of modern property. More about Odd Fellow's Hall in a future issue.

The current Swan was built in 1934 on the site of the old Swan Inn. Had it survived today, the old building would have been a 'Listed Building' as it dated back to the 17th century although many say it was much older! The demolition and rebuilding was carried out during the tenancy of Fred Bartram Earl and his wife Alice May, formally Taylor. Recently married they took over the Swan in October 1914 when Fred was 26. This husband and wife team ran the Swan till 1942 when Fred suddenly died but Alice carried on for another eight years and retired in 1950. One of their daughters, Madge, would go on to marry the late infamous Russell Smith (affectionately known as Mr Mattishall) who many locals have warm and cherished memories of.

The pub was flush to and entered from the road going down two steps. There was no room for parking horse and carts, they used to take these around to the back yard. Many meetings and gatherings were held in the back room. When the Gant was celebrated in the village, there used to be "swinging boats" in the back yard.

The first record of the Swan by any brewery or court is dated 1786. It shows the landlord as Richard Carter and the following extract from a newspaper article gives some idea of what the Swan was like two hundred years ago. "On Monday 31st March 1794 Richard Carter, as tenant in sufferance, offered for sale by auction the property consisting of a: large kitchen, a parlour, 6 bed chambers, good cellars, with every other convenience necessary; a chafe-house, good stables and outhouses, yards, gardens, and about 4 acres and a half of exceedingly good land, with right of common over those large and rich commons in Mattishall."

On September 29th 1832 it was reported that Mrs. Carter had died aged 73. Along with her husband, she had been landlady of the Swan for 43 years. Richard Carter died on August 14th 1843, aged 100 and apparently was still serving at the Swan.



In Science, Year 3 learnt about forces and how to measure them in Newton units. They used Newton meters to try and push or pull different items in the classroom and measure how much force was needed.







Each year the band would return to play in remembrance of those comrades killed in the IRA bomb in 1989 – very happy and sad memories.

Gustav Holst: Nimrod, from the Enigma variations. I just love this as it is so powerful and sad and reminds me of those gone before.

Band of the Royal Scots Dragoon Guards: Black Bear (pipe tune). This is reputedly the fastest marching tune in the British Army. I love the bagpipes and this tune in particular – so much so we had it at our wedding (we didn't march).

Meatloaf: Bat Out of Hell. I like this just because some days a blast of heavy rock really blows away the cobwebs. It is a pretty catchy tune too – and I used to ride a motorbike!

Information on the changes to dial up/landline telephones

This information has been produced by me, Gerry Goldner, to provide you with an understanding of the changes affecting all of the UK. Thousands of end users have been changed over successfully but it is a worrying change for many readers. These notes are provided in good faith but I must advise that it may not be 100% accurate.

Every end user's situation is different. I suggest you ask questions of your supplier. Also ask the people you get support from. I will update these notes using online social media, such as Facebook and Nextdoor. In addition, I hope to supply more news and information in later issues of Miscellanea. You can send me an email with any other questions or concerns. My email address is provided at the end of the article.

The ending of landline and broadband services on old telephone cabling systems

BT is using its wholesale division, **Openreach**, to close down the existing fixed telephone service. This has been approved by the regulator of telecom services providers, Ofcom. The process started in 2017. **As of March 2024**, the target to complete the changeover is **December 2025**.

Openreach have announced that the East of England changes will be starting in the Spring of 2024.

The following guidance notes have been provided by Community Action Norfolk [CAN] to help us understand the changes now in progress across the UK.

It is important to realise that most of these notes relate to the agreements between BT, Openreach and Ofcom. However, all the other suppliers **should be following the same guidelines.**

Why are these changes happening?

The current landline network needs to be replaced because it's old and is becoming difficult to maintain. The new system uses the internet to make phone calls – this offers better quality calls as well as some additional features.

What happens when my home or business is changed to the new digital system?

Your telephone provider will contact you in advance to let you know when your service is changing and what you need to do. In some cases, an engineer will need to visit to make changes. When you're contacted by your provider, let them know if you are a customer matching any of the criteria listed below. And ask any questions or concerns about moving to the digital service.

The following groups of customers are being processed at the end of the changeover periods

• people aged 70 and over. The changes will take place, but much later.

The following reasons are NOT age related:

- people with additional needs
- people who are landline only (i.e. no broadband)
- people with telecare alarms. See item 3 below.
- people with a very weak or zero mobile signal inside the home. This applies to most properties in Mattishall and many areas of Norfolk. If this a problem, in your home, make sure that you tell the provider of your situation.

Other issues to be aware of

- 1. BT are just one of several telephone service providers. Openreach is the current provider of the existing telephone systems. Some of the suppliers of telephone lines are using Openreach as their wholesale provider. However, there are other cabling providers, mainly in more urban areas.
- 2. Be aware of questions and offers from companies and people who want lots of information and start talking about fees and costs. If they claim to be from your existing supplier, ask them to confirm your account number and make them call again.
- 3. The changing system is based on a new fibre optic cable, directly to every property. If you are already using fibre optic to the property [FTTP], you are not affected. If you currently do not have broadband/internet services and do not want either, then the supplier has to provide you with a service that directly supports a talking service. There should not be any extra costs to you. But you may need a new telephone. If the new service and equipment is powered from a wall socket, then it cannot work during a power cut. When the supplier provides the new equipment, they must also provide a battery backup, so you can call out for help.
- 4. If you are using an auto alarm or care line service I suggest you to talk to them as soon as possible. Before the changeover dates.
- 5. Many users do not realise that even if they do not use a landline, the broadband service is on a landline number. The monthly charge includes the line rental and broadband services. These changes will affect every property. You do not have to stay with the existing supplier's contract. You can change supplier at no cost, if you want to. You could find a better service at a lower cost.
- 6. If you are using the landline telephone number, then in most cases it should be transferrable with some loss of service, during the changeover. If you need a new telephone, then it will work by plugging into the router. This type of phone usage is known as VOIP [Voice Over Internet Phone]. If you have a power cut, the router is down so you cannot call for help unless you use a battery backup.

As well as policing events, we've been out on patrol promoting the Street Safe scheme. This is a website that you can use to report anywhere you don't feel safe. You can access this website from the home page of www.Norfolk.police.uk. It's not the place to report crime, instead it's somewhere you can tag specific locations that just make you feel uncomfortable. It could be the lack of lighting, overgrown hedges, bad visibility, persistent anti-social behaviour etc.

Everything you report is then passed on to the relevant agency – it could be us or the district or county council – and action is taken.

We also have our regular SNAP meetings which are your chance to speak to us about issues where you live. It has been great to see so many people turn up to the recent meetings. Please do look out for the dates and locations of the next meetings which are sent to your parish council clerks and advertised on our website.



These priorities are local ones, chosen with the community, which the local beat managers focus on. They are supported 24/7 by their response and specialist colleagues who work on the other areas of policing that help keep you safe.

Police are urging residents to be vigilant following a number of telephone scams in west Norfolk and Breckland.

Officers have received two separate reports from elderly residents this week, claiming to have been contacted by fraudsters purporting to be police officers. During the calls they were encouraged to withdraw large amounts of money from their bank.

The incidents happened in:

- Methwold, west Norfolk, on Monday 20 February. £1000 and a credit card were taken.
- Saham Toney near Watton, sometime between Monday 20 February and Tuesday 21 February. £4000 was taken.

Courier Fraud happens when a fraudster contacts a victim by telephone claiming to be a police officer, bank or from a government department, among other agencies. A number of techniques will then be adopted in order to convince the victim to hand over their bank details or cash, which may then be passed on to a courier.

Residents are reminded that your bank or the police will NEVER ask you to withdraw money or purchase items.

Further advice includes:

- Your bank or the police will NEVER ask for your PIN, bank card or bank account details over the phone – never give these details to anybody.
- Neither the police nor the banks will send a courier to collect money from you.
- Always request Photo ID and if unsure call the police.
- If you're asked to telephone a bank, then always do it on a different phone to the one you were contacted on.
- Fraudsters will keep the line open and have been known to play ringtones, hold music and a recorded message down the phone so the victim believes they are making a call to a legitimate number. Ensure you can hear a dialling tone before calling police or use a friend or neighbour's telephone instead.
- Do not rush into complying to the scammers demands / requests.
- If you have already given your bank details over the phone or handed your card details to a courier, call you bank straight away to cancel the card

Officers are keen for residents to share these messages with members of their local community and also to ensure they contact family and friends, particularly elderly relatives to ensure they are aware of these scams and the warning signs. If anyone has received a similar type of telephone call or has any information about these incidents. Contact Norfolk Police on 101 quoting Operation Radium or the crime numbers 36/12184/24 or 36/12098/24.

Alternatively, Contact the independent charity Crimestoppers 100% anonymously on 0800 555 111.

New Pharmacy/Dispensary Opening times

From Monday 26th February the Pharmacy/Dispensary will be operating with new opening hours of 9am to 6pm Monday to Friday (closed for lunch between 1-2pm).

This is to allow us to continue to provide services during our core contracted hours and to ensure that staff have time to complete essential tasks outside of opening hours. For example, our Pharmabox 24 hour Prescription Collection Point is filled each day between 6-6.30pm so may be unavailable for patient collections during this time.

Additional Opening hours for Lenwade Surgery

From Friday 19th January we will be opening our branch surgery at Lenwade for additional hours on a Friday afternoon. The surgery will now be open to patients from 8.30am to 1pm and 2pm to 5.30pm each Friday. This will give patients more choice in booking afternoon appointments as a doctor will be available on both Monday and Friday afternoons as well as mornings on Monday, Tuesday, Thursday, and Friday. A nurse will be on site Friday in the afternoons from 15th March and samples will be accepted until 3.30pm, and patients will be able to order and collect prescription medication.

We can still give flu vaccines to eligible patients up to 31st March, please contact the surgery if you would like to book in.

Patient Call Back Facility

Please note the Practice has introduced a patient call back facility on our main reception lines for both Mattishall and Lenwade sites.

When a caller contacts reception, if placed in a queue, the caller will be given the option of requesting a call back. The system will recognise when that call would have reached caller number one and initiate a call back.

If the initial call back is not answered the system will attempt one more time, if this is not answered an automatic SMS will be sent to the number (mobile only) advising of the attempted call backs, and if the caller wishes to speak with reception they will need to call again.





A very brief history of Bob Carter Court and the surrounding area.



Bob Carter

Bob Carter Court is a retirement housing complex and was opened on 26th June 1976 by Mrs Mary Carter named in memory of her late husband. Its initial purpose was to house Royal British Legion members in need of safe and economic housing and it was purchased by Housing 21, the current owners, in 1993.

Before Bob Carter Court was built the area was a market garden. Daffodils were likely grown commercially where Daffodil Way is now and Pear Tree Close was part of a pear tree orchard. Holly Close also likely where holly was cut to make wreaths at Christmas time and village ladies were paid one penny per prickly holly wreath they made.

Mattishall Neighbourhood Plan

What is the Mattishall Neighbourhood Plan?

This a a planning document prepared by the Parish Council and helps to define how the parish will grow and change in the future. It includes policies used by Breckland Council in determining planning applications in the village. The plan also takes the opportunity to develop design guidelines and proposes new Local Green Spaces.

Public consultation

The public consultation on the draft Neighbourhood Plan ended on 8th January. A huge thank you to everyone who completed a questionnaire and sent us their views.

These comments were presented and discussed at the February Parish Council meeting and will now form part of the next stage in the process. This is to submit a final document to Breckland District Council, hopefully before the end of April.

What happens next?

Breckland will then carry out another consultation to provide an opportunity for all parties to comment on whether the submitted Neighbourhood Plan meets the required basic conditions. It will then go to an independent examiner who will check that the Plan has been prepared appropriately.

YOUTH CLUB

This has bought into question the demand for this service and the Council are finding it hard to justify the considerable expenditure for such a small number. However, on a good note we are pleased to confirm that the Junior club is now thriving.

The present contract runs until the end of May, the Council at this time will be considering the renewal of the contract.


